Little to Big

Do a Good Turn Daily. That is the Slogan of Scouting. It is a challenge to each of us to look for some way to be of service. The slogan asks us to seek opportunities every day to do something ... anything that will ultimately make a difference.

It is my belief that when we look at this challenge we feel it is too large. It is a lofty goal to actually make a difference in this world.

What we need to do is think little. Little things matter.

When we teach leadership in our Troop one of our principles is to “Focus on the Little Things.” That principle is all about details and those things that add up to big things. Little things like keeping your gloves out of the snow. Just a little thing, but the big thing is cold hands, wet gear, and maybe frost bite. Another example is ensuring that your tent is pitched properly. Making sure your guy lines are taut and pulled in line. Not a big deal, until it rains and your rain fly does not function properly. Just a little thing that makes a big difference.

And so it is with the Good Turn. Little things make a big difference. Holding open a door or carrying a bag. Little things that make a big difference for the person you helped.

A smile could change someones attitude or outlook on the day.

I think we get wrapped up in service for service sake and not for the difference we make.

Just think ... there are about two million Scouts in America. They represent about 103 thousand units. Those units represent Schools, Churches, Communities. So if 2 million Scouts did their Good Turn each day, just something small, we could change our world. That does not even take into consideration the Adult Volunteers that teach, coach, train, and mentor those 2 million Scouts. Add about 1.2 million to that number. 3 million people doing a small act of service every day. When we talk about little to big we can see that we make a big difference when and where it really matters.

In 2015 the Boy Scouts of America logged 1.53 million service hours. Those were hours of service dedicated to building things, collecting food, and working for our communities. That seems like a big number but at the end of the day we may not see the big impact. A lot of our service is dedicated to our chartering partners and people directly impacted in Scouting. That is great and I certainly would not want to take one minute of those hours away ... they make a difference. But in snap shots.

Little to Big ... each of us.. every day. Now that would leave a mark that could be seen from outer space.

Think little to big. Do your Good Turn every day!

Goose Creek District Freeze-O-Ree Recap



The dawn broke early at Camp William B. Snyder on February 11, with temperatures barely rising out of the 30s. Multitudes of Virginia Scouts had arrived overnight to camp out and participate in Scout games and activities. Unbeknownst to them, a chemical spill on I-66 had contaminated countless Friday night commuters, and their zombified remains were making their way through the fields and woods of Haymarket.

Ever resourceful, the Scouts BSA contingent rallied to head off the zombie hoard. Applying Scout skills, they honed their ability to reduce the hoards with bb guns, sling shots and tomahawks. The flag football trophy went to On Your Head Patrol, the chili cook-off champ was Troop 1430B and the winner of the Freeze-O-Ree's Shark Tank was 1148G's zombie crushing crossbow.

As the noble Scouts broke camp on Sunday morning, scraping mud and zombie gore from their boots and gear, there was a lot of talk about doing it all again, only perhaps without the brain-hungry, festering remnants of civilization. Perhaps the countryside will have calmed down by the time they pack up and head to Camp Highroad in mid-April, for the Goose Creek District Spring Camp-O-Ree and its Outdoor Adventure Challenge?.





Lovettsville Scouts Place Second in Freeze-O-Ree



The all-girls patrol of Lovettsville Scout Troop 962 placed second at the Goose Creek District Freeze-O-Ree held Feb. 10-12.

Troop 962 was one of three all girl scout troops and is made up of six Lovettsville girls ages 12-15. The girls said one of their favorite parts of the weekend was competing in the flag football tournament and raising the flag where they had to build a tall, self-supporting flagpole using two poles, rope for lashing, and up to four guy lines.

They said the hardest activity was the "rescue your teammate" event where they had to work together using their lifesaving skills to toss one end of a rope through a distant hole to reach their teammate who was stuck in a hole.

It was their first time participating in a Freeze-O-Ree. They are looking forward to going back next year.

The Camporee's two main events – Patrol Challenge and Adventure Choice – are followed by a Saturday evening campfire featuring your Patrol skits and songs, and of course, the AWARDS presentation! The Camporee cost per participant (for both Scouts and Adults) is \$34.

The Patrol Challenge is all about your Patrol working as a team to put your Scoutcraft skills to the test. Compete in these Challenges to earn the most points and come out on top: Tomahawk Throw, Flamin'Fast, Saw Mill, Sea Base Knot and Lash, Philmont Bear Bag Toss and Northern Tier Canoe Portage.

Troop 58's Northern Tier Okpik Adventure



An adventurous crew of six scouts and two adults from Troop 58 in Ashburn, VA spent a year eagerly anticipating the troop's first arctic adventure at the Northern Tier Okpik program in northern Minnesota. The word Okpik (ook'-pic), which means Snowy Owl in the Inuit language, identifies the Winter Camping program at Northern Tier that began over fifty years ago in 1971.

On the first day, the crew skied with sleds weighing up to 75 pounds holding their gear and made camp at Moose Lake. The adventurers then embarked on an 8-hour cross-country journey across Newfound Lake. Led by the highly skilled guide, Amos, the skiers braved slush fields and followed a wolf trail to reach Canada. Despite skiing the last miles in the dark, the group was rewarded with an incredible dinner prepared by Amos.

The following day, the group packed up camp and headed to Flash Lake, where they set up camp and participated in various outdoor activities. The day began with a 30-minute ice fishing demonstration and later the group had the opportunity to try their hand at Gaga ball in the snow. In the afternoon, the mushers brought over their sled dogs, allowing the group to go for a ride around a small island. The day was capped off with a star walk led by Amos, who shared old Indian folklore with the group.

Troop 58's crew was the first one of the season to make it to prairie portage this winter. Amos said about the Virginia-based crew, "... for our base this was the first trip (to prairie portage) this winter and the kids reminded me that when you are part of a group of positive people working toward a shared goal no amount of slush or open water or skiing in the dark can stop you." This trip was a true test of endurance and a celebration of the great outdoors, offering a once-in-a-lifetime experience for all who participated.

Five of the seven crew members earned the coveted Triple Crown Award having completed three high adventure trips together over the course of the last two and a half years. Eric A. (Assistant Scoutmaster), Ben L., Chris C., Grant K., and Jack A. all earned the award by successfully completing a Philmont New Mexico trek in August 2021, Sea Base Virgin Islands sailing adventure in April 2022, and Northern Tier Opik Minnesota trek in January 2023.

Troop 58 is already preparing for their next high adventure trip back to Northern Tier for a summer 2023 portaging adventure to Atikokan, Ontario Canada!

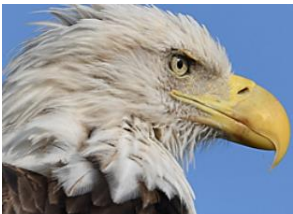

Greenway Eagle Cams



The Dulles Greenway Wetlands has been home to two Bald Eagles since 2005. In 1995, TRIP II established a private 149-acre wetlands preserve in Leesburg, Virginia during the construction of the Dulles Greenway roadway to mitigate the loss of roughly 64 acres of federally protected wetlands. Today, the wetlands property is managed by the Loudoun Wildlife Conservancy and utilized for local wildlife education.

About The Cameras

Two new state-of-the-art high-definition cameras are available to view the nest. Each one is mounted on the nest tree and provides a different view of the nest. If you watch for a while, you may be lucky enough to see eagles flying to and from the tree. The cameras come equipped with low-power infrared (IR) illuminators. This technology allows us to discretely view the eagles at night, without disturbing them. The eagles cannot see this light; it is outside their visible spectrum of light. Neither can humans. If you were at the nest site, looking up at the tree at night, you would only see light from the moon or stars.

Merit Badge Counselor Training is **MANDATORY**



As the District recharter is completed, about 150 MBCs have been dropped from the District roster. About 50 at their request, another 50 who no longer appear to be in the district, and the remaining 50 because they haven't completed the my.scouting.org training module for MBCs that is now mandatory. Those who desire reinstatement need to complete the training, and send confirmation certificate or screen shots to Rich Pender at MeritBadgeDean@GooseCreekDistrict.org. Until then they are not merit badge counselors and should not meet with Scouts.

Cub Scout Bridging



Cub Scout packs, it's that time of year that many Cub Scouts will be bridging into Scouts BSA troops. Make sure all Cub Scout rank advancements and Cub Scout awards are properly entered in Internet Advancement or Scoutbook, **prior** to initiating the transfer to a Scout troop. Awards like Recruiter, Shooting Sports Awards, Outdoor Activity Awards, NOVA, and especially SuperNova Awards; anything earned as a Cub Scout. For rank advancements, things like Cub Scout and Webelos Adventures, and especially their Arrow of Light Rank.

Once a troop accepts a Cub Scout onto their roster it is extremely difficult if not impossible to retroactively correct their Cub Scout records. This is because their advancements records become locked out to the Pack and the Troop cannot enter Cub Scout advancements.

Cyber Chip is no longer a requirement for Cub Scout ranks



The Cyber Chip requirement for Tiger, Wolf, Bear, Webelos, and Arrow of Light has been replaced with watching the grade-appropriate Protect Yourself Rules video.

Lions do not have a requirement for Cyber Chip. It is not a requirement to earn the adventure for rank, only to watch the grade-appropriate video.

A Cub Scout may earn the Protect Yourself Rules Preview Adventure and in doing so they complete the requirement for rank by watching the video.

The Protect Yourself Rules Preview Adventure is not a required adventure.

At this time, Scouts BSA has not made any changes to BSA rank requirements involving Cyber Chip.

Oregon Trail Council's Video on Scouting Safely



A safety related incident in 2018 prompted the Oregon Trail Council to reemphasize their efforts to communicate the BSA's safety rules to its adult volunteers.

One of the results of that initiative is their Scout S.A.F.E. Video, in which the council's Scout Executive, commissioner, vice president of district operations, and two youth members of the BSA walk viewers through the BSA's S.A.F.E. Scouting checklist and other elements of safe Scouting.

"We decided our goal was to make sure all our leaders were educated on those elements of Scouting," says Scout Executive Scott Impecover. "We felt the need to get word out sooner to our leaders, rather than waiting until they took leader specific training."

The [8-minute video](#) is brief and direct, and does a great job of emphasizing the importance of following the BSA's safety rules — and the possible consequences if you don't — without coming across as overly somber or preachy.

It's well worth taking the time to watch it.

2023 Report to the Nation



The National Capital Area Council, BSA (NCAC) is honored to have been chosen to support the 2023 Report to the Nation. As part of this outstanding opportunity, Scouts from the NCAC will be selected to be part of the delegation making the formal presentation of the report to the Clerk of the House of Representatives and to the Secretary of the Senate, which officially places the report in the Congressional Record. Additionally, the report will be presented in-person to as many key leaders in Washington as possible, such as the Speaker of the House, the Senate Majority Leader, Cabinet Secretaries, and the President of the United States.

NCAC Scouts are encouraged to apply to be part of the delegation if they can make themselves available on short notice to be part of the delegation and they meet the following age requirements set by the Boy Scouts of America (BSA):

- Cub Scout - 2nd grade or above
- Scouts BSA – age 14 or above
- Venturer – age 18 or above
- Sea Scout – age 18 or above
- Explorer – age 14 or above

We are seeking Scouts that are charismatic, outgoing, and confident and not afraid to speak with adults or in front of small crowds who also might be involved with children's theater, debate, speech team, or other activities. Alternates will be selected for each of the delegates chosen.

HOW TO APPLY:

To be considered, interested Scouts and their parents/guardians must send a brief biography with a photo of the Scout in uniform to info@ncacbsa.org by March 4, 2023. (This deadline has been extended.) The bio should be a good description of the Scout's experience. Accomplishments in Scouting (Eagle Scout, Arrow of Light, earned all merit badges, etc.) or awards received (recognized by National BSA or our council), should be included in the bio. Submissions can include engaging personal stories (accomplishment, action taken, or barrier overcome) or compelling connections to Scouting (why Scouting matters in their life). The Scouts selected may not necessarily have a lengthy resume and all Scouts are encouraged to apply.

Based on the submissions received, Scouts will be selected for interviews in early March. There is no cost to the youth delegation other than daily travel to and from the NCAC office in Bethesda, MD, which will be the delegation's gathering point each day.

Although the date has not yet been selected, the meetings and presentations typically take place over a two-day period in late March or early April, depending upon the scheduling requirements of the recipients. The meetings happen during business hours on weekdays. Additional time may be spent with the delegation to prepare for the meetings and presentations.

Each year, as part of its congressional charter granted in 1910, the Boy Scouts of America is required to present a report to the United States Congress detailing the state of the organization, its key initiatives, and major accomplishments over the past year. It is a high honor to be selected to represent Cub Scouting, Scouts BSA, Venturing, Sea Scouting and Exploring to our nation's leaders.

18th Annual NCAC Scout Orienteering Meet



Test out your troop or crew member's navigation skills at this **exciting map and compass competition** to be held on May 6 at Kings Landing Regional Park, 3255 Kings Landing Rd, Huntingtown, MD 20639. Scouts and Crew members with compete in age groups and different course levels in the morning as individuals. The afternoon event is designed around competing as a unit (Troop or Crew) to gather the greatest score than the other scouting units. This event is open to all Scouts BSA Troops, Venturing Crews, and other appropriately aged Scouting groups; minimum age for this event is 10 and a half years old.

REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED -- Please be aware that your unit must register online to take part in this event. There is no walk in registration for any unit or scout. Adjustments to the number of members from a unit can be made on the day of the event, but refunds may not be given. A unit is defined as at least two scouts and two registered adult leaders.

Summary: This event is open to all Scouts BSA Troops, GSUSA units (ages 10 and up) and Venturing Crews. Scouts will be paired up (buddy system applies) and compete for awards to be presented to the first 10 places in each event. The morning sessions will include: instruction Orienteering course for Scouts new to the sport, competitions in one of four levels of orienteering courses, and other skill-building competitive events. Each Scout pair will have an opportunity to choose two events in the morning. We strongly recommend instruction take place at a unit level prior to your arrival. The instructional Orienteering course is a "no compete, no awards" hands on teaching course that your scouts can learn by using the Teaching EDGE method to learn the art of Orienteering. To ensure fairness, competition will also be broken into two age groups for most events in the morning, under 14 years of age and Scouts 14 years of age or older. Venturing Crews with members over 18 years old may be scored as a third grouping based on judging decision on the day of the event. After a brief break at 1pm, the afternoon event will be a 90-minute Orienteering score course. The afternoon event is a unit based competition with youth leadership taking charge of their units in planning and directing their teams. The event will be completed with awards from the morning events at 5:00 pm.

Cost is \$10 per youth and includes an event patch for all youth participants. Adults may purchase patches at cost on the day of the event pending availability.

This event is run with volunteers from and supported by the NCAC and has the added experienced of help from the Quantico Orienteering Club.

Buddy system is strictly enforced with all events and adults are not permit "in the woods" during the competitions.* The morning competition will be on the individual (scout) pair level and on the unit level. Each troop or crew unit will have a unit score from this event based on the average of the unit's top five pairs from that unit.



Camping will be available on both Friday and Saturday nights. The cost is \$2 per person per night and can be completed as part of your unit registration. We will assign locations for your troop or crew to camp in the open area within walking distance of the event start and registration area. Please be aware that participant's cars may need to be relocated to the main park area to allow enough space for other scouting units to set up their camp site.

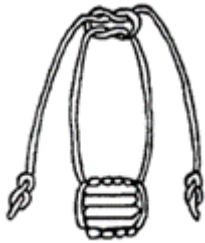

Back Country Outdoor Leader Skills (BCOLS)



Back Country Outdoor Leader Skills (BCOLS) is an optional course offered to adult leaders who have completed the required training in their Scouting program. This course assists Scouters working with youth in the backcountry by providing the skills necessary to conduct a safe and risk-managed high adventure program in venues outside those supported by BSA infrastructure. It has been continuously designed to address new and emerging issues, techniques, and gear.

BCOLS has three key goals:

- Provide adult leaders with an understanding of safety and risk management issues in the back country environment.
- Expose adult leaders to interpersonal, small group dynamics, and leadership models consistent with National syllabi and curricula.
- Familiarize adult leaders with the planning processes, skills, and equipment necessary to a successful back country adventure.

BCOLS consists of two parts (Both sessions must be attended to get credit for the course):

- One day-long classroom session (Saturday March 4, 2023 at Huntingtown UMC, 4020 Hunting Creek Rd, Huntingtown, MD):
 - Working Together — covers needs and characteristics of the age group; discusses group dynamics and the interpersonal skills needed to build and maintain a high-performance team.
 - Trek Planning and Preparation — covers the detailed preparation and planning that is necessary to a successful Trek and includes risk management, Leave No Trace principles, and discussion and displays of the personal and crew equipment used for Trekking, as well as other Trek tools.
- Two-day weekend outdoor session (Saturday April 22 thru Sunday April 23, 2022 at American Chestnut Land Trust, 2650 Scientists Cliff Road, Prince Frederick, MD 20678):
 - Provides a mix of skill presentations and hands-on practice. Activities include Leave No Trace camping skills, problem solving through initiative games, the use of bear bags/canisters, equipment maintenance, stove maintenance, water treatment, menu planning and trail cooking (and clean-up), terrain awareness, health and safety and personal hygiene issues, hands-on land navigation, and trail meditations.

Requirements for attending BCOLS:

- Be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America and age 18 or older.
- Have completed the basic position-specific training courses for their Scouting role.
- Be capable of functioning safely in an outdoor environment. All participants are required to complete the Annual Health and Medical Record. Parts A, B, and C are required which includes a physical.

Reflecting the best of nearly a century of Scouting experience, Wood Badge draws upon the most current leadership models used by corporate America, academic circles and successful organizations throughout the country. Participants can expect to develop skills in many areas, including leadership theory, team building, problem-solving, communication, project planning and more. These skills can be taken back to packs, troops, crews and ships to help leaders guide youth in dynamic Scouting programs. Scouters will find these skills invaluable in their business and personal lives as well.

Wood Badge consists of two parts:

- The first five full days is the initial group training, usually held over two weekends – the first weekend Friday through Sunday, and the second Saturday and Sunday (Both weekends must be attended).
- The second part requires participants to apply the skills they learned by completing a 5-part plan (called a "ticket") over the following 18 months, leading towards the individual participant's vision of a better Scouting future.

Requirements for attending Wood Badge:

1. Be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America and age 18 or older.
2. Have completed the basic position-specific training courses for their Scouting role.
3. Be capable of functioning safely in an outdoor environment. All participants are required to complete the Annual Health and Medical Record. Parts A, B, and C are required which includes a physical. Part C is required for everyone, including people who are not present for more than 72 hours.

Spring Course: March 31- April 2 and April 22-23. Registration closes 3/18/2023

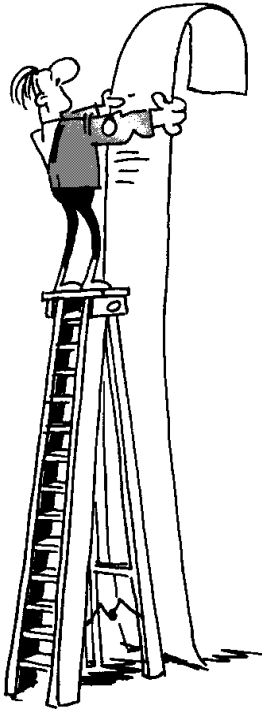
