### Tuesday June 25, 2024

6:30 a.m. Meet and Depart from the Hampton Inn, 2705 Triple L Loop, Ellensburg, parking lot to carpool or meet us at the trailhead at 7 a.m. (25 minute drive to trailhead) <u>Directions from hotel</u>

7:00 a.m. Arrive at Umtanum Creek Trailhead

7:25 a.m. Arrive at half way point/waterfall

8:00 a.m. Arrive back to Umtanum Creek Trailhead and depart to the Kittitas Valley Event Center

8:30 a.m. Arrive at Kittitas Valley Event Center - informal gathering – coffee pastries and conversation.

### **About Umtanum Creek Falls Trail**

Weather along the trail on Tuesday June 25 at 7:00 a.m. will be 55 – 58 degrees based on past, current and forecasted local weather.

Wenas Wildlife Area; 1.9 mile; Waterfall; 137 ft elevation gain; 41-minute average out and back \*Discover Pass required to park at trail head. High clearance vehicles with sturdy tires recommended.

An easy stroll along a burbly creek, the Umtanum Creek Falls Trail has something for everyone in the family to enjoy. The way is shaded by Douglas-fir and ponderosa pine. Look closely for wildflowers like yellow desert-parsley, bluebells, wax currant and bitterbrush. Listen to the different bird songs, using binoculars to spot bluebirds, woodpeckers and more.

The trail is confusing at about 0.3-mile in. The trail goes straight up the rocks along logs. Don't go right and cross the creek. Many hikers have made this mistake.

Identify the sweet fragrance of sagebrush, while keeping an eye out for bighorn sheep on nearby canyon walls. The trail opens to reveal Umtanum Creek Falls, a pretty little waterfall that cascades into a pool surrounded on three sides by basalt walls. Hikers can take a rough trail to the bottom of the of the falls or stay at the top and enjoy the view.

### **Getting There**

From Ellensburg, drive west on Umtanum Road from Canyon Road. Stay on Umtanum Road for 10.0 miles to a signed trailhead area. The last 5 miles of the road is unpaved dirt road with washboards. Watch out for speeding dump trucks.

Recent reviews mention encounters with rattlesnakes on the trail so hikers are advised to be aware of their surroundings. This trail can be popular. It has a new gravel parking lot that can fill up quickly. The road to the parking log is well maintained until the last mile where it becomes a less well-maintained primitive gravel road recommended for AWD/ 4x4 vehicles.

In terms of trail conditions this time of year, reviews mention muddy spots near the falls with slick rocks during rainy weather more typical in May. This is a good option for families with children.
