1 million and growing: BSA membership is on the rise

I've been authorized to announce that [2022] BSA membership has exceeded its year-over-year numbers by more than 3%.

Around mid-December, the BSA's youth membership surpassed 1,025,000, which was the organization's goal for 2022. By the end of the year, the BSA was serving more than 1,042,000 members.

Coming off the COVID-19 pandemic and the bankruptcy proceedings, BSA officials knew that the 2022 recruiting numbers would go a long way toward determining the future of the organization.

So, they set a lofty goal: 1.042 million members was the result of nine consecutive months of membership growth and a retention rate of more than 70% across the board.

A team effort

The 2022 recruiting success story is the result of extensive collaboration between the local councils and the National Service Center, as each worked together to develop goals and plans for recruiting. As a result, 176 councils exceeded their year-end growth.

Of course, none of this would be possible without the dedicated efforts of our thousands of volunteers, enthusiastic parents ... and all of the Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA members, Explorers, Sea Scouts and Venturers who invited their friends to join them on their Scouting adventures.

We encouraged our Cub Scout leaders to recruit new members in the spring, and they did. By fall, we could tell it was working.

Cub Scout youth membership grew by 10.24% over the course of the year.

We asked you to think about how you recruit older youth to the BSA, and you did that, too. Most notably, the BSA's Exploring program grew by 17.35%.

Where do we go from here? One of the great things about Scouting's programs is that, in lots of ways, they can recruit themselves during non-traditional recruiting seasons.

When you wear your unit's T-shirts while picking up trash in your community, going on a hike, or attending a city council meeting, you're signaling to your neighbors that the BSA is here, and we're ready to provide kids with the skills they need to succeed in life.

In 2022, 123 Scouts made Eagle in Goose Creek with a total of 15,820 project hours. The Council had 1,285 Eagle Scouts with 187,692 project hours.

As the District recharter is completed, about 150 MBCs have been dropped from the District roster. About 50 at their request, another 50 who no longer appear to be in the district, and the remaining 50 because they haven't completed the my.scouting.org training module for MBCs that is now mandatory. Those who desire reinstatement need to complete the training, and send confirmation certificate or screen shots to Rich Pender at

MeritBadgeDean@GooseCreekDistrict.org. Until then they are not merit badge counselors and should not meet with Scouts.

Cyber Chip is no longer a requirement for Cub Scout ranks



The Cyber Chip requirement for Tiger, Wolf, Bear, Webelos, and Arrow of Light has been replaced with watching the grade-appropriate Protect Yourself Rules video.

Lions do not have a requirement for Cyber Chip. It is not a requirement to earn the adventure for rank, only to watch the grade-appropriate video.

A Cub Scout may earn the Protect Yourself Rules Preview Adventure and in doing so they complete the requirement for rank by watching the video.

The Protect Yourself Rules Preview Adventure is not a required adventure.

At this time, Scouts BSA has not made any changes to BSA rank requirements involving Cyber Chip.

Well, if you do, our District Advancement Chair, Dr. Alan Steiner, is willing to come to one of your troop meetings and hold an informal talk about it. No presentation, no lecture, just a discussion between him, the Scouts, and the parents about preparing for the process. Overall time would be about 30 minutes, but he has no problem if it goes longer.

Please note that this does not cover all of material covered in the Life to Eagle Seminars the district holds that your troop Advancement Chair/Eagle Coordinator should attend.

We Need More District Eagle Representatives



Goose Creek District currently only has five District Eagle Representatives (DER), three of whom are in the Sterling area. We need more, especially in South Riding, Ashburn, and western Loudoun.

What does a DER do?

- Provides the final approval for Eagle Scout Project Proposals. The DER ensures that the project meets the standards for an Eagle Project and more importantly, talks to the Scout about the planning and leadership requirements of the project. The DER will also go over with the Scout about the entire Eagle process, from requirements still needed to filling in the Eagle Scout Rank Application and what to expect at the Eagle Board of Review.
- Represents the Council at an Eagle Board of Review.

What does it take to be a DER?

There are no set requirements to be a DER but people interested usually have several years of experience with a troop as either a Scoutmaster, ASM, or committee member. We also ask that they attend one of our Life to Eagle Training seminars, which goes over the minutae of the Eagle process that they will have to be familiar with, and to sit down with the District Advancement Chair for a short, philosophical discussion of the process.

Night Hike



When's the last time you went on a night hike, without flashlights? Nighttime is a great opportunity to learn about wildlife, to conquer fear of the dark, and to understand how our eyes work. Night hikes build important outdoor skills and hone your powers of observation. When one of the five senses is diminished the other senses compensate for the loss. During a night hike, sight (the sense most heavily relied on to orient ourselves) is reduced. A diminished sense of sight is disorienting so we will compensate by using hearing and touch.

 <u>Scoutmaster Clarke Green has prepared an outline</u> to using in preparing for a night hike with some experiments/activites to go along with it.

Scout Sunday, Scout Shabbat, and Scout Jumuah



Scouts try their best to live by the 12 points of the Scout Law seven days a week, 365 days a year. But each February, around the time of the BSA's birthday, we ask our Scouts to pause and pay extra attention to the Scout law's finishing touch: reverent.

Through the celebrations known as Scout Sunday, Scout Sabbath and Scout Jumuah, Scouts take a moment to reflect on their faith. Every unit can celebrate Scout Sunday, Scout Sabbath and/or Scout Jumuah as they choose. But the occasions are especially important for Scout units supported by faith-based chartered organizations.

In those units, the celebrations offer a great opportunity to give back in a public way. That could mean wearing the full field uniform to worship services, where the worship leader presents religious awards to Scouts and Scouters. It could mean participating in the service by distributing programs, greeting guests, or leading a song or prayer. Or it could mean a daylong pack, troop, ship or crew service project that benefits the religious organization.

When is Scout Sunday 2023?

Scout Sunday 2023 is Feb. 5, 2022, according to the BSA's Calendar of Religious Observances, which stipulates that Scout Sunday should fall on the Sunday before the BSA's birthday on Feb. 8. But units and chartered organizations are free to schedule Scout Sunday on any Sunday in February. According to the BSA's official guidelines, a local church can "celebrate on the Sunday most acceptable to the pastor and congregation."

When is Scout Shabbat 2023?

Scout Shabbat 2023 is Feb. 10, 2023, according to the BSA's Calendar of Religious Observances and the National Jewish Committee on Scouting. Scout Shabbat (also called Scout Sabbath) is the Jewish observance of the significance of religion in Scouting. It begins at sundown on Friday, and continues into the next day.

Though the National Jewish Committee on Scouting has designated Feb. 10 as Scout Sabbath for 2023, some councils or units will celebrate the occasion on other days. Be sure to check with your council or local Jewish Committee on Scouting to verify the date.

When is Scout Jumuah 2023?

Scout Jumuah 2023 is Feb. 10, 2023, but units may adjust this date to best meet their needs. Scout Jumuah (sometimes stylized as Scout Jumu'ah) is the Islamic observance of the significance of religion in Scouting. It lasts from sundown on Thursday, Feb. 9, to sundown on Friday, Feb. 10. Scout Jumuah offers a chance to recognize the contributions of young people and adults to Scouting within the Muslim community.



Back Country Outdoor Leader Skills (BCOLS)



Back Country Outdoor Leader Skills (BCOLS) is an optional course offered to adult leaders who have completed the required training in their Scouting program. This course assists Scouters working with youth in the backcountry by providing the skills necessary to conduct a safe and risk-managed high adventure program in venues outside those supported by BSA infrastructure. It has been continuously designed to address new and emerging issues, techniques, and gear.

BCOLS has three key goals:

- Provide adult leaders with an understanding of safety and risk management issues in the back country environment.
- Expose adult leaders to interpersonal, small group dynamics, and leadership models consistent with National syllabi and curricula.
- Familiarize adult leaders with the planning processes, skills, and equipment necessary to a successful back country adventure.

BCOLS consists of two parts (Both sessions must be attended to get credit for the course):

- One day-long classroom session (Saturday March 4, 2023 at Huntingtown UMC, 4020 Hunting Creek Rd, Huntingtown, MD):
 - Working Together covers needs and characteristics of the age group; discusses group dynamics and the interpersonal skills needed to build and maintain a high-performance team.
 - Trek Planning and Preparation covers the detailed preparation and planning that is necessary to a successful Trek and includes risk management, Leave No Trace principles, and discussion and displays of the personal and crew equipment used for Trekking, as well as other Trek tools.
- Two-day weekend outdoor session (Saturday April 22 thru Sunday April 23, 2022 at American Chestnut Land Trust, 2650 Scientists Cliff Road, Prince Frederick, MD 20678):
 - Provides a mix of skill presentations and hands-on practice. Activities include Leave No Trace camping skills, problem solving through initiative games, the use of bear bags/canisters, equipment maintenance, stove maintenance, water treatment, menu planning and trail cooking (and clean-up), terrain awareness, health and safety and personal hygiene issues, hands-on land navigation, and trail meditations.

Requirements for attending BCOLS:

- Be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America and age 18 or older.
- Have completed the basic position-specific training courses for their Scouting role.
- Be capable of functioning safely in an outdoor environment. All participants are required to complete the Annual Health and Medical Record. Parts A, B, and C are required which includes a physical.

Wood Badge is the Boy Scouts of America's ultimate leadership training designed to meet the advanced leadership needs of Scouters in all aspects of the BSA, whether unit, district, or council level – from assistant den leaders to Scoutmasters, from Cubmasters to Venturing Advisors, from committee members to commissioners. It is a fun, energetic and inspiring course guaranteed to infuse your unit with fun and meaning – all designed to fulfill the mission of the BSA, and ensure our youth is getting everything they are promised from the program.

Reflecting the best of nearly a century of Scouting experience, Wood Badge draws upon the most current leadership models used by corporate America, academic circles and successful organizations throughout the country. Participants can expect to develop skills in many areas, including leadership theory, team building, problem-solving, communication, project planning and more. These skills can be taken back to packs, troops, crews and ships to help leaders guide youth in dynamic Scouting programs. Scouters will find these skills invaluable in their business and personal lives as well.

Wood Badge consists of two parts:

- The first five full days is the initial group training, usually held over two weekends the first weekend Friday through Sunday, and the second Saturday and Sunday (Both weekends must be attended).

- 3. Be capable of functioning safely in an outdoor environment. All participants are required to complete the Annual Health and Medical Record. Parts A, B, and C are required which includes a physical. Part C is required for everyone, including people who are not present for more than 72 hours.
