



The 6-Second Scout Law

Over time I've come to the realization that I can now tell how long a Scout has been active by how fast they can recite the Scout Law. I have also begun to wonder if those that say it so fast still remember what it is that they are actually agreeing to.

While most Scouts can easily recite the Scout Law, very few truly understand it. At Eagle Board of Reviews I will often ask the Scouts what certain parts of it mean and have been happily, and unhappily, surprised by some of their answers.

Often called the fundamental principles of Scouting, the Scout Law describes the values that every Scout should follow to become an upstanding member in their community.

In *Scouting for Boys*, Lord Baden-Powell wrote, "The Scout Law is not a rigid code of ethics to which a boy must submit; it is a simple, easy-to-remember, inspiring statement of some of the basic principles which a Scout should practice in his daily life."

Lord Baden-Powell considered the Scout Law to be one of the most important aspects of the Scouting program. He stressed the importance of living by the Scout Law, not just reciting it. That by incorporating the values into their daily lives, Scouts would develop strong character, become responsible citizens, and make a positive impact on their communities.

From trustworthiness to cleanliness in thought, word, and deed, each aspect of the Scout Law offers valuable insights that can guide our Scouts in their future. The Scout Law serves as a compass, pointing towards the qualities and values that are essential for them to thrive.

At our meetings we spend a lot of time helping Scouts to learn to say the Scout Law. Having done that we then need to spend time to ensure that they understand it. Let's get them to think about the words as they say them and eliminate the '6-Second Scout Law.'

Accepting Nominations for District Award of Merit



Attention Goose Creek Scouters.

The District Award of Merit is a council award presented by Districts in the same manner that the Silver Beaver is a national award presented by councils. The award is available to Scouters who render service of an outstanding nature at the District level. It is the highest District award that can be given to a Scouter and the only "non-square knot" in the knot award group.

Nominees must:

- Be registered Scouters.
- Have given "noteworthy service to youth," either inside or outside of Scouting—or both. (Note: The nature and value of "noteworthy service to youth" may consist of a single plan or decisions that contributed vitally to the lives of large numbers of youth or it may have been given to a small group over an extended period of time.)
- Consideration will be given to the nominee's Scouting position and the corresponding opportunity to render outstanding service beyond the expectations of that Scouting position.
- The nominee's attitude toward and cooperation with the district and/or council is to be taken into consideration.

You can't nominate yourself, but if you know anyone who should be considered for this award, please complete the attached application and send to: Terry Kolb (*terry.kolb@goosecreekdistrict.org*) by November 27, 2023 with the subject line: "District Award of Merit Nomination".

Robert E. Burt Scout BSA Volunteer Award



The Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) Robert E. Burt Boy Scout Volunteer Award is a BSA-recognized Community Organization Award presented to members of the SAR in good standing who have displayed outstanding dedication to the Scouting Program. Award criteria are based on work accomplishment and dedication rather than specific length of service time. The medal is awarded by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution upon nomination by a state society. Each state society may nominate at least two (2) awardees per calendar year. At the Spring SAR Leadership Meeting, the Eagle Scout Committee will determine whether a state society may nominate additional awardees during that calendar year using a formula based on each state's membership as of January 31st of that year. Awards not presented may not be carried over to subsequent years. Those individuals interested in the Robert E. Burt Boy Scout Volunteer Award should review and complete the application form.

Silver Beaver Award



The Silver Beaver Award is the council-level distinguished service award of the Boy Scouts of America. Upon nomination by their local Scout council and with the approval of the National Court of Honor, recipients of this award are registered adult leaders who have made an impact on the lives of youth through service given to the council. The Silver Beaver is an award given to those who implement the Scouting program and perform community service through hard work, self-sacrifice, dedication, and many years of service. It is given to those **who do not seek it.**

All nominations MUST be received at the MSSC no later than NOVEMBER 30 of this year.

- Record of Service in the BSA

There is no limit to the number of times a Scout BSA, Varsity Scout, or Venturer may apply. Prospective applicants should prepare for the Scholarship competition by earning the three recommended merit badges (American Heritage, Genealogy, & Law) and researching their ancestries while still Star or Life scouts.

Deadline for submission: 15 December 2023

- Completed application form (see contact info below)
- Four generation Ancestry Chart
- Original essay with footnotes and bibliography, not to exceed 500 words written on an American Revolutionary Patriotic Theme.

- A map of projects: Looking for projects near you?
- Tips for planning an Eagle project: Essential tips for Life Scouts.

A place to submit completed projects: Showing off is encouraged.



How to Request Congratulatory Letters for your Eagle Scout



Earning the Eagle Scout Award is something to write home about — literally. Politicians, astronauts, celebrities, and other recognizable figures have been sending hand-signed letters to new Eagle Scouts for, well, 100-plus years.

The very first congratulatory letter was sent in 1912 when the first Eagle Scout, Arthur R. Eldred, received a note from James E. West, the first Chief Scout Executive.

Today, parents and Scout leaders can request these scrapbook-worthy keepsakes from pretty much anyone with a mailbox. But who is known to respond, and how do you contact them? And when do you send off these requests anyway?

When to request Eagle Scout letters

After a Scout completes their board of review, he's officially an Eagle Scout. But most Scouts don't have their Eagle court of honor until weeks or months later, so that's your window for requesting and receiving letters.

Of course, any letters you don't get by the ceremony date can still be added to the Scout/s Eagle Scout scrapbook later

Whom to ask for letters

- City and county officials: Your mayor, city council officials, school board president, superintendent, parks and recreation director
- Religious leaders
- State officials: The governor, your area's state legislators
- Business leaders: CEOs and executives at major corporations based in your city
- U.S. officials: The president, cabinet members, senators, representatives, military leaders, department heads
- Past presidents or elected officials no longer in office
- Prominent national people: astronauts, athletes, filmmakers, actors, and famous Eagle Scouts like Mike Rowe or Steven Spielberg
- Anyone who means something to your Eagle Scout: Get creative! Does he have a
 favorite author, athlete, musician, or actor? Try to track down that person's contact
 information. The letter may go unanswered, but it only costs you a stamp to try.

Where to find addresses

One excellent resource is from the *U.S. Scouting Service Project*:

For addresses not listed there, find the appropriate Web site and look for the "Contact Us" link — usually at the top of the page or at the very bottom.

Some entities, such as NASA or the U.S. Army, allow you to submit request online. Many of those links are at the U.S. Scouting Service Project, as well.

What to include

The U.S. Scouting Service Project recommends including the Scout's full name, troop number, council, and a short description of his Eagle Scout service project. For best results, address it to a specific person, not an organization.

Including a self-addressed stamped envelope makes it that much easier to get a response.

Final thoughts

Go for quality over quantity. Think about it: Would your Eagle Scout prefer four or five letters from people that are important to them or three dozen mainly from people they have never heard of?

Plus, as the U.S. Scouting Service Project notes, keeping the total number of requests from new Eagles to a manageable size may prevent someone from refusing to accept requests altogether.

Bryan Wendel, senior editor of *Scouting* magazine has also written a short article on *how* to request congratulatory letters.

Goshen Camps



For those looking at Goshen summer camps for the first time, here are the different choices:

Camp Olmsted – Scouts BSA / Venturing

Camp Olmsted is a center for STEM, hosting the "Tech Center" with programs including robotics, animation, and design. Olmsted also offers wide variety of programs in aquatics, ecology, outdoor skills, shooting sports, and crafts. Units at Olmsted enjoy meals prepared in the Forster Dining Hall and take part in a dynamic "dining hall program." Camp Olmsted offers camping for 400 and is the largest camp at the Goshen Scout Reservation.

Camp Bowman – Scouts BSA / Venturing

Units who attend Camp Bowman will take part in the Patrol Cooking program, creating the opportunity for Scouts to apply their new and developing scout skills. By working together to cook each meal and care for the campsite, Camp Bowman units see growth in scout independence and teamwork. Camp Bowman offers camping for 300, and includes program areas for outdoor skills, shooting sports, aquatics, crafts, and more.

Camp Marriott – Scouts BSA / Venturing

With a focus on vocational and trade skills, Camp Marriott offers a large variety of merit badge programs in areas including aquatics, ecology, outdoor skills, shooting sports, and eagle advancement. With an emphasis on vocational and trade skills, "The Guild" hosts classes in metal working, welding, automotive maintenance. Camp Marriott offers camping for 300 and offers patrol cooking and "heater stack" dining methods. Camp Marriott is also home to GSR's Provisional Camp program.

Camp Ross – Webelos and AOL Scouts

With the goal to give scouts "a great week and an introduction to scouting," Camp Ross serves as week-long introduction into the Scouts BSA program and future scouting experiences. Camp Ross offers camping for 300 and supports programs in nature, outdoor skills, crafts, shooting sports, and aquatics (including a water trampoline!). Units at Camp Ross enjoy meals from the Dining Hall and participate in camp songs and celebrations with the staff.

Lenhok'sin High Adventure – Backpacking and Canoe Treks

Based on a "plan your own adventure" structure, Lenhok'sin's customizable Backpacking Trek and 61-mile James River Canoe Trek serve as a preparation opportunity for units who may be aspiring to attend a National High Adventure Base, such as Philmont or Northern Tier, in the future. Lenhok'sin backpacking units also take part in other high adventure activities including caving, black powder rifle shooting, blacksmithing, stand-up paddle boarding, and more!

The Enhanced Messengers of Peace Recognition Program



The **BSA's Messengers of Peace program** has launched a series of enhancements designed to more clearly define the awards available and to make it easier to understand how to earn them.

The Messengers of Peace (MoP) initiative began in 2011, when the *World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM)* was looking for a way to encourage Scouts around the globe to do whatever they can to make the world a better place.

The BSA's Messengers of Peace program (you might recognize the patch that we all wear on our uniforms) falls under the framework of the WOSM program, with opportunities for everyone — from brand-new Cub Scouts to seasoned leaders — to make a difference.

"The Messengers of Peace program promotes a vision of Scouting beyond the Scout's own unit," says Marcia Bettich, a member of the BSA's International Committee and the BSA Messengers of Peace chair. "It is designed to help Scouts gain an appreciation of their role in their communities and the world and to learn how they can act locally to truly effect global change.

"These enhancements emphasize that becoming a Messenger of Peace is not a just one-time event. Rather, it is a commitment to a life of service and peace."

The 2023 enhancements were officially rolled out at the 2023 National Annual Meeting and the 2023 National Scout Jamboree and are effective immediately.

2024 Cub Scout Weekend Resident Camp at Camp Snyder, Haymarket VA



Cub Resident Camp is your bite sized introduction to a Scout summer camp program. All registered Cubs, Tigers – Webelos and their adult leaders/parents sleep on cots in 4-person BSA wall tents that sit on raised platforms, eat in the camp dining hall and experience a whole day into the night program. How to Try on Hiking Boots and Shoes

I go into sticker stock every time I visit the shoe section of a sporting goods store. Really? They want me to pay more than \$100 for footwear that I'm buying with the express intention of abusing it until it falls apart? On the other hand, your hiking shoes or boots will be the foundation of your every experience on the trail. You can't get far without them, and an ill-fitting pair can subject you to a smorgasbord of agonies from blisters to frozen, cramped, or sweaty feet.

In other words, expensive hiking boots are worth the cost -- if they live up to their promises. Quality hiking footwear is sturdy enough to protect your feet as you hike for miles, sensitive enough that you can feel your connection to the trail, and comfortable enough that -- if sized properly and worn with the right socks -- you'll rarely, if ever, have to deal with blisters, damaged toenails, and other symptoms of poorly fitted shoes.

The bad news is that there's no single cookie-cutter answer to which hiking boots are best, and there's really no way to be sure which boots will fit you well when shopping online (although you can measure your feet at home). However, once you actually have the boots in your hands, a few quick tests will show if they're right for you. Here's how to get ready:

- Go shopping near the end of the day, when your feet are at their largest.
- Wear the same socks and pants you'd wear to go hiking. If you expect to
 wear a wide range of socks -- say, thin socks for summer hiking and thick
 woolen socks for winter hiking -- bring the thickest and thinnest socks with
 you.

Once you're at the store:

- 1. Ask a salesman or saleswoman to measure both of your feet. This will give you a starting point for boot sizes, and it'll tell you if one foot is larger than the other.
- 2. Lace up both boots, stand up, and wiggle your toes. Your big toes should be close to, but not touching, the front of the toebox. Ask a helper to press his or her thumb down over the front of the boots, just front of your big toe. As a general rule, if there's a full thumb's-width of space between your big toe and the front of the toebox, the boots are too big. (Remember, this assumes you're already wearing your hiking socks -- including thick, winter socks if you're planning on using them.) Also, the lighter-weight (and thus more flexible) the footwear, the closer the fit you can get away with.
- 3. Roll forward onto your toes, then back onto your heels. Do this a few times. If the boots really fit well, your heels won't move up and down inside the boot at all. The more your heels move, the more likely you are to get blisters when using those boots.
- 4. Walk uphill and downhill. If the boots fit right, your feet will stay securely positioned; if they don't fit right, your heels will move around in the boot as you walk uphill, and your toes will slide forward against the edge of the toebox as you go downhill.

Take a stroll around the store at varying speeds. If you feel any pinches, pokes, rubs, or "hot spots" of friction anywhere in either boot, it's not the right footwear for your trail adventures.

My.Scouting.org



The My.Scouting.org portal is a critical resource for registered adults and unit leaders. It provides access to individual and unit account information, training records, reports, and metrics. If you are an adult member of Scouting, you should have a My.Scouting.org account to enable you to perform the following:

For individuals: a.) access and update your contact and personal information directly in the BSA national database. b.) take the required online Youth Protection Training course and print a certificate. c.) take online BSA training courses you need to understand the Scouting program and position specific training required to be considered fully "Trained". (Refer to the NCAC event calendar for additional in person training and outdoor training such as BALOO, Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills, BCOLS, and Powder Horn training).

For Units: a.) access and download the official unit roster maintained in the BSA national database. b.) monitor and track completion of YPT position specific training at a unit level. c.) respond to and track leads from BeAScout.org inquiries using "Invitation Manager" and processing online applications using "Application Manager".

Note: Adding individuals to Scout Book does not officially register an individual in Scouting, this must be done through processing an online application using "Invitation Manager" and "Application Manager".


