








Make sure new families in your pack have this info as soon as they join – This topic applies to all Units

Get daily updates! Download the new Scouting magazine app today.



The data is in! New Scout families want to feel welcome and a sense of belonging in their new unit. And when they do, these Scouts will stay in Scouting programs for a long time.

What does this mean for Cub Scout leaders? Of course, being welcoming and kind to newcomers is at Scouting's core. But there is one tool you can start using right now to get families the info they need to feel welcomed right off the bat.

Check out the new "Welcome to Cub Scouts one-pager" and fill in the blanks for your unit. Then, make handing, mailing, emailing, or texting this info sheet to new parents' part of your welcoming process.

What do new parents, especially Cub Scout parents, need to know right away?

Don't overthink it. The most important information to impart to a new family is how to make it to their first Cub Scout meeting. A family needs the time, date, and place of the meeting as part of the "onboarding" journey.

Onboarding means getting new Scouts and parents looped in with what's going on in your unit and demonstrating the welcoming atmosphere of Cub Scouts. If someone doesn't come from a Scouting background, they may not know the difference between a "den" and a "pack." They likely have no idea how often Scouts meet. And they certainly don't know when and where your unit meets.

That's why it's critical to give new families this info as soon as possible, as simply as possible. Then, parents and kids have a foundational understanding of how Cub Scouts is structured and you can ensure they make it to that first, crucial meeting.

Give new Cub Scout families the information they need quickly and easily



If your Cub Scout unit's onboarding process needs a refresh, we've got your back. Check out the <u>Welcome to Cub Scouts one-pager</u>. It's an editable PDF. Add your unit's info using your computer or print the one-pager and fill it out by hand.

Consider the best way to distribute this onepager to new families. Perhaps your delivery method changes depending on how a family sign up for Scouts. You could turn it into a poster for joining events or copy-and-paste the one-pager's text into an email you send to every new family that registers online. You could distribute it as a flyer or text it to parents after you receive their children's applications.

Why do you want to go?

You want to participate in a Wood Badge course because of things you will learn and do. Here are some of the benefits:

When we accomplish the mission of Scouting, we do it in the units. Therefore, the short form of the purpose is, the purpose of Wood Badge is to strengthen units.

Although the course is different today, what Baden-Powell said in 1919 still applies:

One of the purposes of Wood Badge training is to get Scouters to think about the practice of Scouting, to meet together, to exchange experiences, and to live together in the spirit of the Scout Oath.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND? Scouts who have completed their unit's introduction to leadership course, have been practicing these skills, and are ready for the next level of training should attend NYLT once they meet all Eligibility Requirements.

NYLT ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS Scouts must:

- Complete their home Unit's Introduction to Leadership Skills course*
- Receive approval from your Scoutmaster or Unit leader
- Be at least 13 years of age by course start date
- Earn First Class rank, if registered in a Troop
- Have current BSA Health Form (Parts A, B, and C)
- Be comfortable camping and cooking outdoors
- Commit to attending the entire course

WHAT NYLT IS (AND IS NOT) NYLT is not like summer camp and is not designed for rank advancement or earning merit badges. NYLT is an intense and challenging hands-on leadership training program. It is essential that NYLT participants be physically, emotionally, and mentally prepared to handle the demands of this advanced training. In order to get the most benefit from this unique experience, participants must exhibit emotional maturity, a positive attitude, proficiency in basic camping and outdoor cooking, and have an ambition to serve in leadership roles.
