2025 Guide to Advancement

Scouting America has published the <u>2025 Guide to Advancement</u>. There are a number of changes. I'll provide a "first look" at the changes below. <u>Merit badge changes</u> for 2025 also are available on the Scouting America website.

The Guide will take effect on January 1, 2025. Scouts currently working on rank requirements, particularly the Eagle rank, should continue using the legacy requirements through the end of the year. I expect an update to Scoutbook and a new Eagle Scout Rank Application early in 2025 to accommodate the new updates.

Scouts who have already started a merit badge, unless the change indicates otherwise, have the choice of finish the badge using the legacy requirements or switching to the new requirements.

The Council Advancement Committee will prioritize publishing guidance where individual changes in the Guide to Advancement impact youth and unit practices related to advancement. They hope to have something out by the end of January. In the interim, please do your best to abide by the spirit of the new national policy. If you have doubts or questions, please reach out to me.

During a quick look at the 2025 Guide this morning, I identified the following changes:

- **Active Service** The text regarding alternatives to the third test (GTA 4.2.3.1) has been shortened significantly with an increased emphasis on participation in Scouting.
- **Group-Online Merit Badge Instruction** (GTA 5.0.8.0) The text provides additional clarification regarding group instruction and also mentions generative AI.
- Unit Leader's Role in Merit Badge Process (GTA 7.0.0.3) Strengthens the unit leader's role in counseling Scouts about merit badge counselors.
- **Merit Badge Fundraising** (GTA 7.0.4.10) Merit badge instruction must not be used as a fundraiser.



2025 Guide to Advancement (cont.)

- **Group Merit Badge Instruction** (GTA 7.0.4.12) New section added with guidelines about aspects that are good, of concern or to be avoided.
- **Recording Boards of Review** (GTA 8.0.1.2) Recording boards of review, either voice or video, is never appropriate.
- **Eagle Reference Letters** (GTA 9.0.1.3) The number of references changed from six to four with all four now being general references. There are no specific references for employer, education, etc. Parents and relatives are strongly discouraged from writing reference letters. The unit leader and committee chair do not write letters for the Scout.
- Collecting Eagle Reference Letters (GTA 9.0.1.7) The Scout now is responsible for requesting references. Councils choose the method and where the letters are to be submitted.
- Advancement for Members with Special Needs (GTA chapter 10) Has been significantly rewritten.

The above list is NOT a comprehensive description of all the changes in the 2025 Guide to Advancement. They simply are the ones that jumped out at me as I took a quick look.

I would welcome feedback on the above changes and any others you see in the new Guide to Advancement. I would particularly value feedback related to how youth and units would be affected by the changes and what recommendations you might have on how best to adapt to them.

As always, please reach out if you have questions or are uncertain on how best to proceed with assisting young people as they advance in Scouting.

This is a virtual" Life to Eagle seminar. The Life to Eagle seminar is an outstanding opportunity for Scouts to virtually meet the District representatives they will be working with on their project, their Eagle Scout Rank Application and their Board of Review.

We encourage all Life Scouts working on Eagle, as well as advanced Star Scouts, to attend a Life to Eagle seminar. While we will work with any Life Scout who wants to complete the Eagle Rank, it takes little time to identify those that attended the seminar. They have fewer struggles and do a much better initial job with their project proposal and ESRA. When I was a Scoutmaster, I also noted that Scouts who attended a Life to Eagle seminar needed less of my time and were faster to understand and follow the advice I was giving them. I see that as another good reason for Scoutmasters to promote the Life to Eagle seminar.

We also encourage parents/guardians to accompany their youth so they can understand the Trail to Eagle and learn how they can best support their Scout. Leaders or other adults involved in supporting Scouts working on Eagle who haven't attended a seminar in the last two years are urged to sign up and attend. The Scout program does change. Adult volunteers working with Scouts who don't keep up with the program have, on occasion, provided Scouts with inaccurate advice that has created unnecessary hurdles in their pursuit of Eagle. We all want to avoid this. Attending a Life to Eagle seminar is a great way to update your knowledge of the Scouting America advancement program and help you provide accurate, up to date advice to your youth.

Wood Badge 2025 - Camp Snyder

Wood Badge is the Boy Scouts of America's ultimate leadership training designed to meet the advanced leadership needs of Scouters in all aspects of the BSA, whether unit, district, or council level – from assistant den leaders to Scoutmasters, from Cubmasters to Venturing Advisors, from committee members to commissioners. It is a fun, energetic and inspiring course guaranteed to infuse your unit with fun and meaning – all designed to fulfill the mission of the BSA, and ensure our youth is getting everything they are promised from the program.

Reflecting the best of nearly a century of Scouting experience, Wood Badge draws upon the most current leadership models used by corporate America, academic circles and successful organizations throughout the country. Participants can expect to develop skills in many areas, including leadership theory, team building, problem-solving, communication, project planning and more. These skills can be taken back to packs, troops, crews and ships to help leaders guide youth in dynamic Scouting programs. Scouters will find these skills invaluable in their business and personal lives as well.

Wood Badge consists of two parts: The first five full days is the initial group training, usually held over two weekends – the first weekend Friday through Sunday, and the second Saturday and Sunday (**Both weekends must be attended**).

The second part requires participants to apply the skills they learned by completing a 5-part plan (called a "ticket") over the following 18 months, leading towards the individual participant's vision of a better Scouting future.

Requirements for attending Wood Badge:

- 1. Be registered members of the Boy Scouts of America and age 18 or older.
- 2. Have completed the basic position-specific training courses for their Scouting role.
- 3. Be capable of functioning safely in an outdoor environment. All participants are required to complete the Annual Health and Medical Record. Parts A, B, and C are required which includes a physical. Part C is required for everyone, including people who are not present for more than 72 hours.

National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT)

NYLT is an exciting 6-day program designed for youth to learn leadership skills that will help them succeed in Scouting and in life!

<u>WHO SHOULD ATTEND?</u> Scouts who have completed their unit's introduction to leadership course, have been practicing these skills, and are ready for the next level of training should attend NYLT once they meet all Eligibility Requirements.

NYLT ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS Scouts must:

- Complete their home Unit's Introduction to Leadership Skills course*
- Receive approval from your Scoutmaster or Unit leader
- Be at least 13 years of age by course start date
- Earn First Class rank, if registered in a Troop
- Have current BSA Health Form (Parts A, B, and C)
- Be comfortable camping and cooking outdoors
- · Commit to attending the entire six-day course

Powder Horn (14 Years Old and above; Typically held in August each year)

Powder Horn is a skills resource course for Venturing and Scouts BSA leaders and youth of the Boy Scouts of America. Powder Horn is also described as a "hands-on resource management course" designed to give Scouting leaders "the contacts and tools necessary to conduct an awesome high-adventure program" in their Scouting unit.

Climbing Level 1

Learn how to help Scouts climb on nearby natural rock and become a resource for your unit. Scouts 16 or older and Scouters 18 or older can become qualified instructors by completing Climbing Level I Instructor training. This year we offer five class sections:

DON'T BE THIS GUY



GET BCOLS TRAINED

This course was developed by a group of Scouters in 1993; it has been continually updated to meet current techniques and technology. This course is designed to support the older youth programs of the BSA. It is aimed at all adults working with older youth regardless of program (Boy Scouting, Venturing, or Exploring). Cub Scout Leaders or people without camping experience SHOULD NOT training this training. All participants MUST complete Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills, as well as the position-specific training for their program area prior to attending this course. All participants must be able to meet current physical requirements of the BSA Annual Health & Medical Record.

The target audience is adult leaders planning High Adventure treks at backcountry venues not supported by BSA infrastructure; however, units planning to attend High Adventure bases supported by BSA will find this course useful, because unit shakedowns will, most likely, take place in venues not supported by BSA infrastructure. If you are participating in an NCAC-sponsored High Adventure Trek, you must also take the course offered by the NCAC High Adventure Committee.

Youth participants (16 and up) will be admitted on an individual basis and requires the nomination by the unit leader. Youth must have completed unit leadership training (Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops or Crews, etc.) as well as National Youth Leadership Training.

Back Country Outdoor Leader Skills is offered by the Council Training Committee as an optional follow-on to the basic course, Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. Its goal is to provide adult leaders with an overview of such topics as:

- Stove Maintenance Risk Management Equipment Maintenance Crew Equipment Needs & Selection •
- - Hygiene & Health On the Trail Tips Wilderness First Aid Overview

<u>Part 1</u> — Addresses ways to effectively work with older youth and covers the detailed preparation and planning that must be done before you go out, including risk management. Summarizes the personal and crew equipment used for lightweight camping. Plans are also made for the weekend overnight session. (Part 1 is the EXPLAIN & DEMONSTRATE part of EDGE.)

<u>Part 2</u> — Participants will practice core leader skills for the outdoor program — Leave No Trace, navigation (map & compass plus GPS), terrain awareness, expedition menu planning and food preparation, stove and stove maintenance, wilderness first aid issues, expedition health and hygiene, team building. (Part 2 is the GUIDE part of EDGE.)

<u>Part 3</u> — While not required, we strongly suggest participation in the Hikeoree which will allow BCOLS training deaders to apply the BCOLS training with their youth at a real-world event. (Part 3 is the ENABLE part of EDGE.)

Additional Self-Pay Membership Renewal Notes

How unit coordinators can prepare

- 1. **Valid Emails** Key 3 (or delegate) should check the unit roster (https://my.scouting.org, login, Menu, select unit, Roster, export roster) to ensure all registered adults and leaders have valid email addresses.
- 2. **Whitelisting** Recommend parents/registered adults whitelisting "@scouting.org" or check their Junk/SPAM folders periodically for renewal messages
- 3. **My.Scouting.Org Accounts** Ensuring all parents have a my.scouting.org account. If not, they can create one at https://my.scouting.org, Create Account. It should ask for the BSA ID of their youth. If not, let Rus/Liz know and we can establish the parent/guardian relationship.

4. Review Reports

- a. **Monthly reports** Reports will be emailed to Unit Key 3 (CM/SM, CC, COR) for those whose registration is expiring within the next sixty (60) days.
- b. **Generate Reports (as needed) -** The Unit Key 3 can generate report from Organizational Manager (https://my.scouting.org, login, Menu, Organizational Manager, Reports you can adjust the date ranges as needed.)
 - i. Member Opt-Out Report those that have selected not to receive renewal emails
 - ii. Members Due to Renew those members due to renew within two months or who are lapsed
 - iii. Members who have renewed all youth and adult who have renewed this year.
- 5. **Youth Applications** Decide if the unit wants to automatically renew Youth Applications. This will reduce your approval workload.
