




If you live in Louisburg, how long have you been a resident?




Which of the following best describes your employment situation?



If you are employed, where is the location of your employment (City)?






What is your perception of the following quality of life factors?


Weighted Score from 1 (Poor) to 5 (Excellent)




What is your perception of the pace of growth in Louisburg?




What types of new development do you prefer? (check all that apply)


Which of the following best describes your perception of traffic in Town?










HISTORIC POPULATION CHANGE


COUNTY POPULATION GROWTH




POTENTIAL TOWN POPULATION GROWTH


TOWN POPULATION PYRAMID




















PLACE OF EMPLOYMENT














