The first time I ran for office was in 2013 for a Lisle Township Trustee position and in 2016 for DuPage County Board Member, District 3. I like to run for office as my way to ensure that a good person who is accountable to the people has a chance to be elected.

Please briefly describe your position on the following issues:

Campaign Finance Reform and/or Election Reform

This is a much needed reform. We cannot have fair elections if companies like General Motors and Comcast keep on pumping large amounts of money into politicians' campaigns in Illinois. This also makes accountability to the public much harder and systematically places citizens as second-class citizens

The Budget/Taxation and Education Funding Reform

As a homeowner and small business owner, I understand the need to come up with other viable solutions for tax revenue, such as the LaSalle Street Tax. We cannot rely on our homeowners and business owners to bear any further burdens of the Illinois budget.

Education Policy

I am a parent with 2 small children in public elementary school. School is not what it used to be, it is filled with 2-3 hours of screen time on any given day for an average 3rd grader pre-COVID-19. I have learned a lot about the educational system and the standardized testing needs to be stopped. From the feedback I received, teachers do not have enough time to be creative or run their own schedule because they are too busy with the standardized tests.

Energy Policy

Renewable energy should be our sole focus of development and investment. Coal and nuclear power needs to stop.

Environmental Policy

Power over environmental policy should be home-rule, where the residents of municipalities have control over their environment. Anything less would be unfair.

Economic Policy

A focus on supporting small business and self-sufficient communities could keep local money on the local level, which is the best thing we can do for a stable and long-lasting economic policy. Crime and Criminal Justice (including drug policy & gun violence)

A better living wage and access to mental illness treatment could reduce crimes and crime-ridden areas. Crimes should be re-evaluated with a view to the harm to society and appropriate sentences.

- Drug Policy: Support Marijuana from being a Federal Schedule I drug. I believe that if
 we gave our children more individual support and economically-stable homes, they will
 not become adults who feel the need to commit crimes to survive.
- There are sustainable gun solutions including registration of guns and sellers, reinstating the 1968 definition of a gun-dealer and banning sales at gun shows.
- White-collar crimes should be investigated more and held accountable to the fullest extent of the law.

Health Care

Health Care is a basic human right. We should ensure that we have a sustainable budget and ensure that people get essential medical care and annual psychical exams.

Transportation Policy

We must support a better transportation system, especially in suburban areas where public transportation around communities are very minimum.
