Scout service hours (up to 3 hours) will be available. Each participating Scout earns a unique patch and rocker.



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Chair's Chat November 1, 2022

As I write this note I am realizing that this is the last Chairs' Chat and Newsletter of 2022. It is time to look back and see what we have accomplished and look forward to where we can go in the coming years. So where are we?

For the last 2 months I have been visiting with many of our Packs as they conducted their new member Join Scouting events. It was great to see the enthusiasm and commitment of the leaders and the happy, eager faces of the potential new Scouts. What is the result? As of Oct. 19^{th,} our overall membership is up by 54 Scouts over October 2021, and we are already up 22 Scouts over year end. In addition, we have a new Pack coming on this week with at least 15 Cubs. This is great. It shows that we have an eager Scouting audience and leaders who want to deliver the promise of Scouting.



What remains to be done with membership? We need to make sure all those who visited our Packs get follow up if they have not yet joined. We need to attract and register more girls in both Cub Scouts and Scouts BSA. We need to continue to recruit in our minority communities and we need to make sure no one is denied the opportunity to join Scouts for financial reasons.

Even though we are facing some financial headwinds, we have succeeded in reaching our Friends of Scouting fundraising goal and did it early. Popcorn sales are ongoing. We already have 2 units who have sold over \$10,000 of product with a combination of storefront sales, wagon sales, and online sales. They will be earning over \$4000 for their Pack programs.

Our program has been going great this year. We had a terrific District Pinewood Derby in March, a great Spring Camporee with our Fall Camporee happening just about press time. In May we had a fine turnout for our Flags In event and hope to have a great attendance for the Veteran's Day Flags In. Many Scouts have been taking advantage of the Life to Eagle Seminars.

What lies ahead for program? Over the next 2 years there will be an emphasis on leader training. We will need to get all unit leaders trained for their position. That means all Cubmasters and Den Leaders will need Cub Scout Specific Training and all Scoutmasters and Assistant Scoutmasters will need Scoutmaster Specific Training, Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills and Weather Hazard Training. Why wait until it is required? It will make you a more effective leader now.

Our District Annual Meeting is coming up on November 30th. If you are a Charter Organization Representative or a District Committee Member, I hope you will join us. We will be presenting a full District status report and electing our District Committee to serve us for 2023.



2022 National BSA Fee Structure

NCAC Volunteers,

Summer Camp is in full swing and I hope all those who have participated in a Scouting adventure this summer have had a fantastic time! Thank you for the leadership you provide to deliver the Scouting program in National Capital Area Council.

Last week the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America announced an increase to the national membership fee structure. To ensure the Boy Scouts of America has the resources to fulfill the promise of Scouting, the following structure will take effective **August 1st, 2022.**

2022 Membership Fee infographic

\$75 for Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouts participants

\$45 for Exploring participants

\$45 for all adult volunteers (includes cost of background check)

\$100 for a unit charter/affiliation fee

\$25 one-time joining fee for new program participants in Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouts (Not pro-rated)

\$15 for Scout Life magazine; this is the first price increase since 2005

Over many years, the Boy Scouts of America has worked diligently to keep all membership fees as low as possible. As you know, costs continue to rise, and the annual fee must be increased to address the fiscal realities we face to deliver a safe and quality Scouting program. The outlined membership fees cover the cost of essential services provided by the National Council in Irving Texas which include; program resources, liability insurance for those participating in approved Scouting activities, criminal background checks, youth protection, and the development of intellectual property used throughout the movement. All membership registration fees are collected to support the operation of the National Council.

Our local Council, National Capital Area Council, does not retain any of the above referenced fees, when members register or renew their membership with the Boy Scouts of America. As we continue forward, the membership fee structure continues to be evaluated and how we deliver the Scouting program for future generations.

Thank you for all you are doing to positively impact the lives of thousands of Scouts and their families through Scouting in National Capital Area Council.

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2023 Charter Renewal Process Has begun for NCAC and George Mason District Units

Every Unit Key 3 (COR, Committee Chair and Unit Leader) should take the time and review this Handbook to understand the Recharter process, the timeline and what their part is in the 2023 Recharter Process. Unit Committee members should also review the handbook to understand this process.

2023 Unit Recharter Timeline

- 1 August 30 September 2022 Units collect and validate recharter Data and collect BSA registration fee
- 1 October 2022 Units begin to input recharter data into online system
- 24 October 2022 Units should have completed entering Charter Renewal data and submit to council
- 24 Oct 24 Nov 2022 Commissioners/NCAC work with Units to address issues found during submission process
- 31 December 2022 Current 2022 unit charter expires
- 1 January 2023 Units without new charters posted become lapsed units and lose the ability to accept or process On-line Applications for new members or for transfers in or out
- 1 March 2023 Units without new 2023 charters posted become dropped units and members lose access to records in my.scouting.org and Scoutbook – members and units are no longer part of BSA. Units loose BSA insurance coverage.

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The Following is from Chapter One of the 2023 Charter Renewal Handbook:

UNIT INFORMATION

This year the Boy Scouts of America is introducing new Rechartering software. It will be effective for all units that have a charter expiration date of 31 December 2021 or later. The new program will be part of Internet Advancement and will not require an access code to use it; however, it will be only accessible to those members of the unit who are part of the Key 3 or have been designated as a Key 3 Delegate. As you work through the recharter system, the software will alert you to inconsistencies in your data. All warnings and errors will have a pop-up notice. If it's an error, it would also be a blocker, so a notice would keep you from proceeding. A warning will only have a pop-up appear letting you know something will need to be further addressed. If help is needed with warnings or errors, contact the District Renewal Expert for assistance.

Below is information that is extremely important to the Committee Chair and Unit Leader about what needs to be done to complete the Internet Advancement Renewal process for their unit this year.

RECHARTER PROCESS

The recharter process is broken down into two parts – The **Data Collection** phase and the **Data Input** phase. There are specific processes required in each phase and neither is more important than the other. In fact, the Data Input phase cannot be done without the Data Collection phase being completed first.

For the **Data Collection** Phase, the following processes need to be completed:

- review Chapter One of the Council Charter Renewal Handbook
- conduct a Membership Inventory comparing the roster from my.scouting.org to your unit roster, identify Scouts who are not returning and reason why along with adults who are not returning and identify adults and Scouts from the unit's roster that do not appear on the official my.scouting.org roster and submit applications for them along with the appropriate fees (waiting to submit the applications with the recharter application will NOT get them on your current year roster)
- with the assistance of the Charter Organization Representative (CR), select leaders for the next charter year
- with Unit Leader (UL) assistance, select direct contact leaders for the next charter year and have them approved by the CR
- identify the unit Renewal Processor (RP) team
- attend the District Charter Renewal training
- ensure the unit is properly coded (especially for Packs (Boy Pack (BP) or Family Pack (FP))
- identify volunteers with expired YPT or YPT that will expire before 1 May of the new charter year
- identify a committee member to collect the registration and Scout Life magazine fees for recharter

While the above task may seem daunting, they can be completed in the two months leading up to the Data Input phase and will reduce the overall effort needed to complete it. As the Cub Scout and Scouts BSA mottos say "Do Your Best" and "Be Prepared."

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Important Dates for Units

The most important dates for units to remember are:

- ❖ 1 August 30 September Data Collection part and registration fee collection
- August September Submit applications for new members and for leader position changes
- 1 October Data Input part begins
- 24 October NLT date for completed Charter Renewal files to be submitted to council
- 31 December Current unit charter expires
- 1 January Units without new charters posted become lapsed units and lose the ability to accept or process On-line Applications for new members or for transfers in or out
- 1 March Units without new charters posted become dropped units and members lose access to records in my.scouting.org and Scoutbook – members and units are no longer part of BSA

While units are only focused on their own charter renewal packets, the District Rep can be responsible for any number of charters ranging from 30 to over 100 and the Council is focusing on almost 1,000 charters to get processed and posted before 31 December. By working on your Data Collection and Data Input parts and completing them early so your charter can get turned in on-time will greatly decrease the chances that your unit will become a lapsed unit or worse a dropped unit. The Committee Chair is responsible for the consequences of a unit becoming a Lapsed Unit or a Dropped Unit.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

Scouts who have completed their unit's introduction to leadership course, have been practicing these skills, and are ready for the next level of training should attend NYLT once they meet all Eligibility Requirements.

NYLT ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

Scouts must:

- Complete their home Unit's Introduction to Leadership Skills course*
- Receive approval from your Scoutmaster or Unit leader
- Be at least 13 years of age by course start date
- Earn First Class rank, if registered in a Troop
- Have current BSA Health Form (Parts A, B, and C)
- Be comfortable camping and cooking outdoors
- Commit to attending the entire six-day course

WHAT NYLT IS (AND IS NOT)

NYLT is not like summer camp and is not designed for rank advancement or earning merit badges. NYLT is an intense and challenging hands-on leadership training program. It is essential that NYLT participants be physically, emotionally, and mentally prepared to handle the demands of this advanced training. In order to get the most benefit from this unique experience, participants must exhibit emotional maturity, a positive attitude, proficiency in basic camping and outdoor cooking, and have an ambition to serve in leadership roles.

Behavior at NYLT: Participants agree to conduct themselves in accordance with the Scout Oath and Law.

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2022 Journey to Excellence – NEW INFO from BSA

Journey to Excellence is the Boy Scouts of America program to help Packs, Troops, Crews, Ships and Posts to plan, monitor and evaluate their performance and their ability to serve youth. There are specific criteria for the unit to plan and accomplish. These standards are reviewed each year and revised standards are published.

The 2022 Journey to Excellence Standards are now available.

Here are the major changes in the JTE scorecards for 2022.

- 1. The standards are written as activities that the unit will do. This is to emphasize that JTE is primarily a planning tool.
- 2. The Cub Scout scorecard has many changed standards. This is because of changes in the Cub Scout program.
- 3. For standard #10, Gold now includes recruiting a new leader. We have found that the best units continually recruit parents and other adults who have never been involved in Scouting.

There is no requirement, no expectation and, in fact, we might discourage a unit from believing that they should achieve Gold in all JTE criteria. A great unit is balanced in the service that it provides to youth. There is no shame and no problem if a unit achieves Silver or Bronze. That unit is serving youth. We regard the various colors as meaning:

Bronze – Effective Silver – Excellent Gold – Exceptional

This course was developed by a group of Scouters in 1993; it has been continually updated to meet current techniques and technology. It is aimed at all adults working with older youth regardless of program (Boy Scouting, Venturing, or Exploring). This This training IS NOT recommended for Cub Scout leaders or people without camping experience. All participants are strongly encouraged to complete Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills, as well as the position-specific training for their program area (Venturing or, Boy Scout) prior to attending this course. All participants must be able to meet current physical requirements of the BSA Annual Health & Medical Record.

The target audience is adult leaders planning High Adventure treks at backcountry venues not supported by BSA infrastructure; however, units planning to attend High Adventure bases supported by BSA will find this course useful, inasmuch as unit shakedowns will, most likely, take place in venues not supported by BSA infrastructure. If you are participating in an NCAC-sponsored High Adventure Trek, you must also take the course offered by the NCAC High Adventure Committee.

Youth participants (16 and up) will be admitted on an individual basis and requires the nomination by the unit leader. Youth must have completed unit leadership training (Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops or Crews, etc.). National Youth Leadership Training is strongly recommended. Back Country Outdoor Leader Skills is offered by the Council Training Committee as an optional follow-on to the basic course, Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills. Its goal is to provide adult leaders with an overview of such topics as:

- Trek Planning Leadership Skills Team Development Leave No Trace Water Treatment •
- Stove Maintenance Risk Management Equipment Maintenance Crew Equipment Needs & Selection •
- - Hygiene & Health On the Trail Tips Wilderness First Aid Overview

<u>Part 1</u> — Addresses ways to effectively work with older youth and covers the detailed preparation and planning that must be done before you go out, including risk management. Summarizes the personal and crew equipment used for lightweight camping. Plans are also made for the weekend overnight session. (Part 1 is the EXPLAIN & DEMONSTRATE part of EDGE.)

<u>Part 2</u> — Participants will practice core leader skills for the outdoor program — Leave No Trace, navigation (map & compass plus GPS), terrain awareness, expedition menu planning and food preparation, stove and stove maintenance, wilderness first aid issues, expedition health and hygiene, team building. (Part 2 is the GUIDE part of EDGE.)

<u>Part 3</u> — While not required, we strongly suggest participation in the Hikeoree which will allow BCOLS trained leaders to apply the BCOLS training with their youth at a real-world event. (Part 3 is the ENABLE part of EDGE.)

TROOP UNIT LEADERS including COMMITTEE CHAIRMEN

As you prepare for your Unit's upcoming 2022-2023 program, we wanted to remind you of the requirements needed for a youth or adult to become an Order of the Arrow Ordeal **Candidate**.

Youth Membership Qualifications:

- 1. Be a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America.
- 2. At the time of their election, youth must be under the age of 21, hold the Scouts BSA First Class rank, the Venturing Discovery Award, or the Sea Scout Ordinary rank or higher, and following approval by the scoutmaster, crew advisor or Sea Scout skipper, be elected by the youth members of their unit.
- 3. The youth must have experienced **15** nights of camping while registered with a troop, crew or ship within the two years immediately prior to the election. The 15 nights must include **one**, **but no more than one**, **long-term camp** consisting of at least five consecutive nights of overnight camping, approved and under the auspices and standards of the Boy Scouts of America. **Only five nights of the long-term camp may be credited toward the 15-night camping requirement**; the balance of the camping (10 nights) must be overnight, weekend, or other short-term camps of, at most, three nights each. Ship nights may be counted as camping for Sea Scouts.
- 4. Assistant scoutmasters who are 18, 19 or 20 years old are also considered to be youth members for the purpose of OA elections. All requirements shown above must be met for a young assistant scoutmaster to be eligible for election.

Prior to the annual election, the unit leader must certify the nominee's Scout spirit and youth membership qualifications. Voting for youth candidates will be based on their spirit of brotherhood, cheerfulness (no matter how tiresome their duties), and a willingness to give unselfish and wholehearted service to others at all times.

Adult Membership Qualifications:

Each year, upon holding a unit election for youth candidates that results in at least one youth candidate being elected, the unit committee may nominate registered unit adults, 21 years of age or older, to the lodge adult selection committee. The number of adults nominated can be no more than one-third of the number of youth candidates elected, rounded up where the number of youth candidates is not a multiple of three. In addition to the one-third limit, the unit committee may nominate the currently serving unit leader (but not assistant leaders), as long as he or she has served as unit leader for at least the previous 12 months. Recommendations of the adult selection committee, with the approval of the Scout executive, will be candidates for induction, provided the following conditions are fulfilled:

- 1. Selection of the adult is based on the ability to perform the necessary functions to help the Order fulfill its purpose and is not for recognition of service, including current and prior achievements and positions.
- 2. The individual will be an asset to the Order because of demonstrated abilities that fulfill the purpose of the Order.
- 3. The camping requirements set forth for youth members are fulfilled.
- 4. The adult leader's membership will provide a positive example for the growth and development of the youth members of the lodge.
