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## Why Have Range Activities in Scouting?

- Popular program that promotes recruitment and retention
- Opportunity to teach safety at a young age
- Future competition opportunities: high school, college and Olympic sports
- Potential lifelong hobby

Suit against Boy Scouts: 'Pattern of failures' led to fatal shooting of 11-year-old at Hawaii campsite





3 to face firearms offenses in child's shooting death at Hawaii Boy Scouts camp

## Programs Available

#### Cub Scouts

- Council and District Camps & Events Only: No Pack or Den!
- BB Guns, Archery, Slingshots
- Webelos/AOLs: Pellet Rifles at Council Long-term Camps Only
- Supervision: Cub Scout Rangemaster or higher certifications (NRA Rifle Instructor for Web/AOL pellet rifle at Council camps)

#### Scouts BSA, Venturing, Sea Scouts

- NEW: Identical activities in each program
- Troop/Crew/Ship Unit-level Events
- National High Adventure Base, Council, District Camps & Events
- Supervision: NRA Instructors/Range Safety Officers or USA Archery Instructors (third-party training and certification)





# Required Council Pre-Approval

# Advance Approval by NCAC *Required* for Troop/District Events

- Approval Process Through Council Range & Target Activities Committee
- Big Issues:
  - Permissible Activity and Equipment
  - Qualified Supervision (all certifications will be checked)
  - Approved Location
- Recommend MINIMUM of 2 months' lead time
- Council will confirm all requirements are met for a safe and fun event





We'll focus on the opportunities available in Scouts BSA and higher programs



- Air Rifle/BB Gun (BBs also available for Cubs)
  - Air rifles must shoot at 540 Feet per second (FPS) or less, .177
     caliber pellets, single shot only (new limitation)
- Rifle
  - .22 caliber rimfire bolt action only
  - With/without box magazine
  - No semi-autos, lever action

Prone or supported bench positions recommended





#### Shotgun

- 12 Gauge or smaller
- Ammo: Shot size 7.5, 8, 9 (typical skeet/trap shot sizes)
- Can be any action type, semi-auto recommended
- Straightaway trap recommended



#### Muzzleloading Rifle/Shotgun

- Must be of modern manufacture
- Kit guns must be inspected by a gunsmith
- No Flintlocks





- Archery (also available for Cubs)
  - Proper sized equipment and pull weight
  - Recurve or Compound Bows
  - Target points, No broadheads/field points
- Slingshots/Wrist rockets (also available for Cubs)
  - Ammo must not be hard (no stones, etc.)
  - Biodegradable preferred: suggest dog food kibbles
- Tomahawk/Knife Throwing
  - Hawks: French or Blackhawk—10-18" handles
  - Purpose-specific commercial throwing knives
  - NOT hatchets or Scout knives!





- Previous Venturing and Sea Scout
   Marksmanship programs no longer exist
- Pistol New Program
  - Scouts BSA, Venturing, Sea Scouts
  - "Older Scout" Program
    - Age 13 and out of 8<sup>th</sup> grade or age 14+
  - Must use NRA First Steps Orientation Program
  - May only be done at Council/District level
  - All firearms must be Council provided
    - No personally owned firearms
  - Additional restrictions apply
- Cowboy Action Shooting (not available in NCAC)





It is essential that all range activities be conducted under the supervision of qualified instructors



#### **New Requirement**

 All Unit-level activities MUST have at least one registered adult unit leader on-site who has completed the new Range Activities SAFEty

#### Description

#### Rifle/Air Rifle/Muzzleloading/Pistol

- NRA Certified Rifle Instructor or Range Activities Director
   AND NRA Certified Range Safety Officer (2 people)
- Ratio: 1 RSO and Instructor to 8 Scouts
- Muzzleloading: NRA/NMLRA ML Instructor; 1:1 Ratio
- Pistol: NRA Pistol Instructor; 1:1 Ratio

#### Shotgun

- NRA Certified Shotgun Instructor or Range Activities Director AND NRA Certified Range Safety Officer (2 people)
- Ratio: 1 to 1 Instructor to Scout that is currently shooting
  - (1:6 RSO permitted with 1:1 Instructor)





#### Archery

- USA Archery Level 1 (or higher) Instructor or Range Activities
   Director
- Ratio: 1 to 8

#### Tomahawk/Knife Throwing/Slingshots

- Responsible adult with experience with the discipline
  - (NRA Instructor/RSO or USAA Instructor preferred)
- BB Rangemaster OK for slingshots
- Ratio: 1 to 1 (1 to 4 for slingshots in Scouts BSA and higher)





# Where can my Troop/Crew shoot?


- Firearms
  - Scout Council Range
  - Public/private "Commercial Range"
    - "Commercial" includes private clubs with permanent ranges and other requirements
  - NO Private Land or Ad Hoc Ranges
- Archery/Throwing Sports
  - Anywhere that is safe, legal and can be set up per Scouting America guidelines
  - Guideline links available on Scouting.org





## Merit Badge Program

- All Range operations for unit merit badge instruction and requirement completion must be under control of a currently certified NRA or USA Archery Instructor
- Some merit badge counselors in NCAC are not certified to manage the range activities and on-range shooting required for a scout to complete the merit badge.
