

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Climbing Level I Instructor Training April 17 & 18 2021

Learn how to help Scouts climb on nearby natural rock. The NCAC Climbing Committee will offer April 2021 Climbing Level I Instructor training on Saturday, 4/17 and Sunday, 4/18 at the Devil's Kitchen climbing area on Maryland's <u>Sugarloaf Mountain</u>. We will meet each day at 8:15 am near the East View Parking Area and conclude by 4:30 pm. Details are available in our <u>logistics memo</u>.

- **Dates**: Saturday, 4/17/2021 and Sunday, 4/18/2021
- **Fee**: \$40.
- Accommodations and Food: No camping is allowed on Sugarloaf Mountain. No meals will be provided.
- **Location**: Sugarloaf Mountain, Devil's Kitchen climbing area. Devil's Kitchen is a line of cliffs parallel to and a short walk north from the road between Sugarloaf Mountain's <u>East View Parking Area</u> and <u>West View Parking Area</u>. We will meet at the <u>parking spaces</u> directly opposite the "Rock Climbing at Your Own Risk" sign just west of the East View Parking Area. Approximate meeting spot GPS coordinates are **39.26021**, **-77.39142**.
- Course Duration: 26.5 hours of online, in-class and hands-on instruction.

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USA ARCHERY LEVEL 1 & 2 INSTRUCTOR TRAINING SATURDAY & SUNDAY, APRIL 17 & 18, 2021WALKERSVILLE WATERSHED, FREDERICK, MD

The Level 1 archery instructor course is for adults and youth 16 years of age or older*. It is a one-day
(Saturday 4/17 only) course covering how to shoot archery and how to run a range safely. This course requires
that you demonstrate how to do a new archer safety briefing and pass a written exam in order to obtain the certification. The level 1 course content includes range safety, range setup, basic equipment setup and repair,
and how to teach the basic steps of shooting. Those who successfully complete the Level 1 course will be able to:
□ Run a BSA archery range; Run a Cub Scout archery range at the District or Council level; □ Teach the BSA Cub Scout Archery Range Officer course, certifying other adult Scouters to run a Cub Scout archery range. i.e., Day Camp, at the District or Council level; and □ Counsel archery merit badge for Boy Scouts.
The Level 2 archery instructor course is a full two-day (4/17 & 4/18) course designed for adults 18 years of age or older who work with a more established archery program such as J.O.A.D., A.S.A.P., college clubs and loca

clubs with a strong beginner component. The Level 2 course students MUST attend both days as they will help instruct the Level 1. Upon completion, the Level 2 instructors can teach and certify Level 1 archers. The Level 2 course content includes basic shooting steps, introduce intermediate shooting steps, safety, range setup, equipment setup and repair, fitting equipment to an archer, how to teach archery and how to teach a Level 1 instructor course. YOU DO NOT ALREADY HAVE TO HAVE COMPLETED THE LEVEL 1 TO REGISTER FOR THE LEVEL 2. To be certified as a USA Level 2 archery instructor, you must have:

1 Of the Level 2. To be defined as a Contest of Earth of Mistractor, you must have.
 USA Archery or NFAA membership (you must bring your membership card with you to the course);
□ Successful background screen (can be completed later); and

□ Completion of all segments of the USA Archery SafeSport Program (can be completed later).

Courses will start promptly at 8 a.m. and will last 8-hours. The cost of the **Level 1 course is \$80.00**, and the Level 2 course is \$160.00 payable by mail. Your course fee includes all course materials and equipment. Orange juice, coffee, and donuts will be provided. You are welcome to bring your own archery equipment for use during the class. For those who do not own their own archery equipment, it will be provided. REGISTRATION DEADLINE FOR THESE COURSES IS APRIL 1. SIGN UP EARLY AS SPACE IS LIMITED AND THERE IS NO GUARANTEE YOU WILL GET INTO THE CLASS EVEN IF YOU SUBMIT A REGISTRATION BY THE DEADLINE. Once registered, you will receive an email confirmation with directions to the range, instructions on where to meet and what to bring. This course is weather permitting so dress accordingly. A Few Black Bear Facts


- -Female bears are called sows, male bears are called boars
- -Cubs are born in January or early February
- -Cubs are born nearly hairless and weigh 6-12 ounces
- -Anywhere from 1-4 cubs are born at a time
- -The sow will care for the cubs for about 1.5 years
- -Feeding bears is illegal in Virginia



Baden-Powell often said, "A Scout smiles and whistles under all circumstances."

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



George Mason District 2021 (Virtual) Merit Badge Event





















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George Mason Order of The Arrow - 2021 Ordeal Initiation
