Patriot District Pinewood Derby

It's Cub Scout Pinewood Derby season again, and most Cub Scout Packs in the Patriot District have once again been busy preparing their cars, holding their individual racing and show events, and getting ready for the annual District Pinewood Derby. The District extravaganza for 2015 will be held on Saturday, March 7, at Living Savior Lutheran Church located at 5500 Ox Rd (Route 123) in Fairfax Station.

Each Pack in the Patriot District is invited to register one Cub Scout in each of five rank categories, and in one of two event categories, that will enable their participation in either the Speed or Show competitions. Thus, up to 10 Cub Scouts per pack are invited and permitted to participate. The District Pinewood Derby is not an open event and all participants must be pre-registered by their Pack Committee. The registration fee for each participating Cub Scout is \$9.00. A document containing the rules for 2015 and providing much additional information has recently been distributed to Pack leaders. The rules for 2015 are essentially unchanged from last year. Congratulations to all of the units who achieved goals in the Journey to Excellence (JTE). As of this date, over 80% of our units attained Bronze, Silver or Gold and most were Gold. That means leaders are working hard to provide a fun, robust and well-rounded program to help our youth develop citizenship, character, and fitness that will aid them for life as they make America an even better place.

Because of additional dedication and work by many, your National Capital Area Council is a Gold Council and your Patriot District is a Gold District! We're proud of our contribution to the Council's success. I especially want to that the nearly forty Commissioners in Patriot's Commissioner Corps for the impact they have had locally and beyond.

These are exciting times in Scouting as Packs show and race their new cars in the Pinewood Derby and celebrate at the Blue and Gold event. It's also exciting that many boys are completing their Arrow of Light and crossing over into a Troop. Here are two tips to make sure the cross over process is smooth. First, the Pack needs to submit the Arrow of Light award in Internet Advancement as soon as possible. Only the Pack can submit Cub Scout advancements including AOL; the Troop cannot! Second, any Scout joining a new unit needs to complete a new Youth Application. We want Scouts to register in the Troop as soon as possible so that they can advance in Boy Scouts. So the sequence is important: 1. Record AOL and 2. Complete a new Boy Scout application.

As a reminder, Commissioners want to help get all of your youth and adult applications processed effectively. So turn in all applications to your Commissioner: Unit Commissioner, Assistant District Commissioner, or me. We'll do an initial quality control check and be prepared to follow up for you if there are any complications. We'll get all applications to Council through our District Executive.

You should see some good training opportunities coming this year. The great training event happening this month is the University of Scouting at Hayfield Secondary School

Spring 2015 Camporee

New Market Battlefield New Market, Virginia April 17 – 19, 2015



As of December 1, 2014

Scoutmasters and other unit leaders, final registration for scout units planning to attend the Spring 2015 Camporee is taking place. Registration will finish by February 10, 2015. Units do not have to make a final commitment or pay until March 2015. Early registration is needed because this is a multi-district camporee and is limited to two thousand participants. He will answer every e-mail and his phone number is (703) 455-9050. The cost of the camporee is twenty dollars (\$20) per participant. The camporee also is open to Venture Crews, Explorer Posts Sea Scouts and Webelos. https://www.ncacbsa.org/event/newmarket. The cost of the camporee is twenty dollars (\$20) per participant. The camporee also is open to Venture Crews, Explorer Posts Sea Scouts and Webelos. https://www.ncacbsa.org/event/newmarket. Venture and Explorer participants will be given leadership positions as commanders and staffs at the brigade and regimental levels. Order of the Arrow (OA) members will show case their membership and run the Opening Ceremony and the Camporee Campfire.

The camporee will be held on the New Market Battlefield in New Market, Virginia on April 17 - 19, 2015. Join 2,000 Scouts and Scouters as we re-enact the Civil War battle of New Market, Virginia. Scouts will be the participants in the re-enactment of the battle, participating as either Union or Confederate soldiers. During the camporee scouts will:

- 1. Camp on the battlefield
- 2. Re-enact the Battle
- 3. Participate in a Civil War "Grand Review" where each troop will be announced and parade in front of the reviewing stand.
- 4. Visit the battlefield museum
- 5. Tour the Bushong farmhouse and supporting buildings
- 6. Walk the battlefield
- 7. Train as a Civil War soldier

Additionally, Scouts will attend a camporee opening ceremony and a fantastic evening campfire put on by the Order of the Arrow. Scouts will have a chance to attend an outdoor church service with several hundred other scouts. There will be Protestant, Catholic and Jewish services. On Friday evening, there will be a Camporee Staff, Senior Patrol Leader and Scoutmaster Cracker Barrel.

"Put the boys in and may God forgive me for the order." With those words, Confederate Major General and former United States' Vice President John C. Breckinridge directed the Virginia Military Institute (VMI) Cadets deploy for battle at New Market. The Union Army was advancing and a dangerous gap had developed in the center of the Confederate battle line. The cadets surged forward, went around the Bushong farmhouse, plugged the Confederate Army's line and helped repulse the Federal assault. Some of the cadets were only 15 years old. Next, when the Confederate forces advanced, the cadets surged into the Union line, helping to force the Federal troops to flee. The cadets captured two cannons in their assault. At New Market, 10 cadets were killed and another 47 were wounded out of 257 cadets that had marched northward from school just days earlier. The Battle of New Market was the last Confederate victory in the Shenandoah Valley.

Cub leader training is being held both 6 and 7 June.





The P.R.A.Y. Program

Curriculum Goals:

- To provide an opportunity for young people and families to explore their faith together
- To help children realize that God is active in every part of their lives
- To help children know that Jesus is their best friend
- To memorize the Lord's Prayer

General Description: The *God and Me* curriculum is designed to help children become best friends with Jesus and tell their story of "God and Me" together. Children will tell their story of "God and Me" by starting with the creation story. Children will learn that God is their Creator and that God calls them by name, and they will give praise to God. Their story will continue as they learn of God's love through Jesus. As they tell parallel stories of their own birth and the birth of Jesus, they will proclaim that Jesus was born to be their Savior. Their story will grow as children learn that God wants them to pray. Children will be encouraged to talk and listen to God as they share from their heart. Their story of "God and Me" will wrap up with the parable of the lost sheep. As children learn to lean on God as their Good Shepherd, they will be challenged to reach out and be "good shepherds" to those around them.

*The term "Protestant" includes AME, Assembly of God, Baptist, Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), Church of God, Episcopal, Lutheran, Nazarene, Pentecostal, Presbyterian, Reformed, United Church of Christ, United Methodist, Independent Churches and others.



Membership Corner

Youth Head Counts

Congratulations to the Patriot District for bucking the trend of declining membership. Membership in traditional units grew by 15 during 2014; and Tiger Cubs increased by a whopping 31 during 2014. However, concern remains for an overall decline in membership within the NCAC as shown in Tables A and B below, especially Tiger Cubs, which is the entry point into scouting for a majority of scouts.

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Baden-Powell

Robert Stephenson Smyth Baden-Powell, known as B-P, was born in Paddington, London on 22nd February 1857. His father died when B-P was only three years old. In 1876 he went to India as a young army officer and specialized in scouting, map-making and reconnaissance. His success soon led to his training other soldiers. Returning home in 1903 he found that he had become a national hero. He also found that the small handbook he had written for soldiers ("Aids to Scouting") was being used by youth leaders and teachers all over the country to teach observation and woodcraft.

B-P set to work rewriting "Aids to Scouting", this time for a younger audience. In 1907 he held an experimental camp on Brownsea Island in Dorset, to try out his ideas. He brought together 22 boys, some from private schools and some from working class homes, and took them camping under his leadership. This was to be considered the starting point of the Scout Movement. "Scouting for Boys" was published in 1908 in six fortnightly parts

He retired from the army in 1910, at the age of 53, on the advice of King Edward VII who suggested that he could now do more valuable service for his country within the Scout Movement. With all his enthusiasm and energy now directed to the development of Boy Scouting and Girl Guiding, he travelled to all parts of the world, to encourage growth and give inspiration. The first World Scout Jamboree took place at Olympia, London in 1920. At its closing scene B-P was unanimously acclaimed as Chief Scout of the World.

In 1938, suffering from ill-health, B-P returned to Africa, which had meant so much in his life, to live in semi-retirement at Nyeri, Kenya. Even there he found it difficult to curb his energies, and he continued to produce books and sketches. On January 8th, 1941, at 83 years of age, B-P died. He was buried in a simple grave at Nyeri within sight of Mount Kenya. His advice of "try and leave this world a little better than you found it" is as relevant –if not more- today and continues to inspire young people all over the world.
