Why We Do This: One Scoutmaster's Thoughts

After spending a week at Summer Camp, sleeping in a tent and enduring all types of weather, here are a few things I observed:

I saw 16- to 17-year-old Scouts take a shy, quiet Scout who was new to our troop under their wings and make sure he felt welcome.

I saw a Scout that had never been "Up North" tube and canoe down the Rifle River, laughing and in awe of everything he was seeing.

I saw a young lady Venturer, new to the Scouting program, take to it like a duck to water, and it was amazing how she could get the other Venturers to work with her.

I saw young boys who have never been away from home making breakfast for 25 people and smiling while we guided them through it.

I saw young Scouts playing an actual board game — no controller needed — imagine that for a second!

I saw Scouts sit through hours of rain and not complain.

I saw young Scouts who thought they could do it all by themselves figure out that it's better to work as a team.

I saw a Scout who was in tears last year when he couldn't make it three feet up the climbing tower climb like he'd been doing it for years while the troop cheered him on — a moment I will never forget.

I saw a young Scout whose feet could barely touch the water when he was in his tube never give up in the relay race, even though he didn't make it more than 10 feet from shore. His troop rallied around him, praising him from not giving up.

I saw Scouts who didn't understand why they were asked to do things (but did them anyway) stand tall when their troop's number was called to stand and receive their Honor Troop Award — some of them may have even pumped up their chests a bit!

Through it all, I saw nothing but smiles, and that, folks, is why we do it! When it's all said and done, it's not about me or the other adult leaders in camp.

It's about the Scouts, and I'm proud to be their Scoutmaster.



Cub Scout Program Changes Announced



It's official! The Cub Scout program will be updated for the 2024-25 program year. Over the past several years the National Cub Scouting Committee has identified four areas to improve the Cub Scout program to ensure that it is fun, simple, and easy. These updates are based on feedback from over 23,000 parents and Cub Scout leaders through various surveys and data.

The four areas of improvement are the Bobcat badge, Cub Scout Adventures, Webelos, and Cub Scout Awards.

Bobcat will no longer be a badge that is earned once when a Cub Scout joins. It will become a required Adventure for each rank and earned each year. The requirements for the Bobcat Adventure are different for each grade to make them age-appropriate.

Cub Scout Adventures have been improved to make it easier to deliver the program to multi-rank dens or as a Pack. To earn each rank in Cub Scouting will require a Cub Scout to earn the six required Adventures and two elective Adventures. Required Adventures reflect the aims and focus areas of the BSA. The number of elective Adventures increases.

Webelos and Arrow of Light will be separated. Webelos becomes the 4th-grade program in Cub Scouting. Arrow of Light becomes a stand-alone badge of rank for 5th graders and will no longer be associated with Webelos. Arrow of Light will be the program that prepares Cub Scouts to join Scouts BSA.

Cub Scouts Awards will be reimagined as Cub Scout Adventures. Topics like camping, STEM, and range and target sports will remain and are reimagined into elective Adventures that can be used towards earning a badge of rank.

The changes will take effect officially on June 1, 2024.

There are a lot of details that will be shared in future episodes of *Cub Chat Live!* Make sure to check out the episodes. Cub Chat Live! is a weekly Facebook Live show that streams live every Friday at 2 p.m. Central. Episodes are recorded and are now available as a podcast.

BSA has a *Cub Scout Program Updates FAQ 11-16-23* posted. This will probably be revised as questions come in. Of particular note is the one that relates to our current 4th graders.

Q: What do we do with current 4th graders who are Webelos?

A: Current 4th grade Webelos should focus only on Webelos required Adventures and not start any work on Arrow of Light. It is suggested that they focus on the elective Adventures that will not be available to them next year as an Arrow of Light. Those elective Adventures are Aquanaut, Art Explosion, Aware and Care, Built It, Earth Rocks!, and Modular Design.

NESA Scholarships



Beginning Dec. 1, the *National Eagle Scout Association* will be accepting applications for multiple scholarships of varying amounts. Applicants must have completed an Eagle Scout board of review before Jan. 24, 2024; must be members of NESA (*click here* to join); and must submit their application through the *NESA scholarship portal* between Dec. 1, 2023, and Jan. 31, 2024. Full requirements and conditions are listed *here*.

Other eligibility requirements include:

- Eagle Scouts may apply beginning in their senior year of high school through their junior year in an undergraduate program or by the halfway point of their associate degree program or skilled trade program.
- Recipients may receive a NESA scholarship one time only.
- NESA scholarships are available to Eagle Scouts currently enrolled in or accepted by an accredited educational institution as a full-time student (at least 12 credit hours) in a program leading to an academic degree (including associate degrees) or a skilled trade program.
- Cooke four-year scholarship awardees must be enrolled in an accredited four-year college or university as a full-time student (at least 12 credit hours) in a program leading to a bachelor's degree.
- NESA scholarships are not available to students attending any of the U.S. military academies.
- NESA scholarships are not available to graduate students pursuing a master's or doctoral degree.

Last year, 69 Eagle Scouts received a total of \$524,000 from NESA to aid in their educational endeavors. These scholarships are made possible by generous donors and NESA members that help the alumni organization.

The district Advancements &; Recognition Committee (ARC) implements processes that help achieve the BSA advancement program. As members of the district's ARC, DERs are central to many of the steps taken by Life Scouts on their way to Eagle. Major tasks that the DERs perform are.

- a) Advise unit leaders about the Life to Eagle process and the methods for conducting boards of review.
- b) Provide final review and approve Eagle Scout Service Project (ESSP) proposals submitted by Scouts.
- c) Provide (final) review and approval of Eagle Scout Rank Applications ESRAs) as a representative of NCAC.
- d) Serve as the council/district representative in Eagle Scout Boards of Review (EBoRs).
- e) Participate in the review of Eagle Scout candidate appeals if a unit denies their application for advancement at the board of review.

Date Became a Boy Scout on Eagle Application



One of the first fields to fill in on the Eagle Scout Rank Application, and the hardest to remember, is the date the Scout became a Boy Scout. This is the date that the parent signed the application to join the troop, not the day they got the Scout badge. Some troop membership/advancement chairs keep the application on file for as long as the Scout is a member of the unit.

Why is this date important? Because anything the Scout earned before the reported date, and yes Scouts can earn merit badges as soon as they join and before they get their Scout badge, is considered invalid.

While <u>primarily</u> targeted for the Life-to-Eagle Advisers & Coordinators at the unit level, these trainings, but are by no means limited to same. Life Scouts and their parents are strongly encouraged to attend as well. The key goal is to get each of the unit Eagle Advisers up to speed on changes to the process, and some of the district-level mechanics of same. That way, they can help share the message to the Life Scouts in their units on a more frequent basis.

If you are a Life-to-Eagle Adviser or Advancement Chair for your Unit and have <u>not</u> attended one of these in Goose Creek within the last 2 years, you really should make an attempt to do so.

Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) Eagle Scout Recognition and Scholarship Program



Any Eagle Scout is eligible to apply who is still actively registered in a Scout unit provided that he does NOT reach his 19th birthday in the calendar year of application, whether he is enrolled in high school or college. There is no limit to the number of times a Scout BSA, Varsity Scout, or Venturer may apply. Prospective applicants should prepare for the Scholarship competition by earning the three recommended merit badges (American Heritage, Genealogy, & Law) and researching their ancestries while still Star or Life scouts.

Deadline for submission: 15 December 2023

Required Items for Application:

- Completed application form (see contact info below)
- Four generation Ancestry Chart
- Original essay with footnotes and bibliography, not to exceed 500 words written on an American Revolutionary Patriotic Theme.

BSA's Rule on Registering All Adults Who Participate in Overnight Activities



Earlier this fall, the BSA updated Scouting's Barriers to Abuse. The updated policy requires adults who spend the night at official BSA events to be registered.

Effective Sept. 1, 2023, all adults staying overnight in connection with a Scouting activity must be registered as an adult volunteer or an adult program participant.

Michael's Woodshop is Expanding



Since opening in 2018, Michael's Woodshop has become one of the most popular activity venues at Camp William B. Snyder, offering fun, hands-on activities for all NCAC Scouting youth. Activities in Michael's Woodshop attracted over 1,800 youth participants in 2022 and is expected to exceed that number in 2023. In order to accommodate the increasing demand, Michael's Woodshop has begun the renovation and outfitting of additional space in the STEM Shack. In August, Michael's Woodshop Volunteers teamed up with volunteers supporting Camp Snyder's monthly Sawdust Saturdays to remove a large volume of unneeded "clutter" and removed a partition to ready the space for renovations.

The success of Michael's Woodshop is attributable to the incredible support from the NCAC Scouting community in the form of shop volunteers, tool donations and of course, the time and effort of all the leaders who coordinate shop events for their units. We are excited about the expansion and ongoing support will be critical to our continued success.

Become a Volunteer: Since its inception, Michael's Woodshop has been operated and maintained by a team of dedicated volunteers. We will need additional Shop Volunteers to support the expanded level of activity. Roles are available for adults and youth, from novices to experienced woodworkers. Goshen Camps



For those looking at Goshen summer camps for the first time, here are the different choices:

Camp Olmsted – Scouts BSA / Venturing

Camp Olmsted is a center for STEM, hosting the "Tech Center" with programs including robotics, animation, and design. Olmsted also offers wide variety of programs in aquatics, ecology, outdoor skills, shooting sports, and crafts. Units at Olmsted enjoy meals prepared in the Forster Dining Hall and take part in a dynamic "dining hall program." Camp Olmsted offers camping for 400 and is the largest camp at the Goshen Scout Reservation.

Camp Bowman - Scouts BSA / Venturing

Units who attend Camp Bowman will take part in the Patrol Cooking program, creating the opportunity for Scouts to apply their new and developing scout skills. By working together to cook each meal and care for the campsite, Camp Bowman units see growth in scout independence and teamwork. Camp Bowman offers camping for 300, and includes program areas for outdoor skills, shooting sports, aquatics, crafts, and more.

Camp Marriott - Scouts BSA / Venturing


With a focus on vocational and trade skills, Camp Marriott offers a large variety of merit badge programs in areas including aquatics, ecology, outdoor skills, shooting sports, and eagle advancement. With an emphasis on vocational and trade skills, "The Guild" hosts classes in metal working, welding, automotive maintenance. Camp Marriott offers camping for 300 and offers patrol cooking and "heater stack" dining methods. Camp Marriott is also home to GSR's Provisional Camp program.

Camp Ross – Webelos and AOL Scouts

With the goal to give scouts "a great week and an introduction to scouting," Camp Ross serves as week-long introduction into the Scouts BSA program and future scouting experiences. Camp Ross offers camping for 300 and supports programs in nature, outdoor skills, crafts, shooting sports, and aquatics (including a water trampoline!). Units at Camp Ross enjoy meals from the Dining Hall and participate in camp songs and celebrations with the staff.

Lenhok'sin High Adventure – Backpacking and Canoe Treks

Based on a "plan your own adventure" structure, Lenhok'sin's customizable Backpacking Trek and 61-mile James River Canoe Trek serve as a preparation opportunity for units who may be aspiring to attend a National High Adventure Base, such as Philmont or Northern Tier, in the future. Lenhok'sin backpacking units also take part in other high adventure activities including caving, black powder rifle shooting, blacksmithing, stand-up paddle boarding, and more!

The My.Scouting.org portal is a critical resource for registered adults and unit leaders. It provides access to individual and unit account information, training records, reports, and metrics. If you are an adult member of Scouting, you should have a My.Scouting.org account to enable you to perform the following:


For individuals: a.) access and update your contact and personal information directly in the BSA national database. b.) take the required online Youth Protection Training course and print a certificate. c.) take online BSA training courses you need to understand the Scouting program and position specific training required to be considered fully "Trained". (Refer to the NCAC event calendar for additional in person training and outdoor training such as BALOO, Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills, BCOLS, and Powder Horn training).

For Units: a.) access and download the official unit roster maintained in the BSA national database. b.) monitor and track completion of YPT position specific training at a unit level. c.) respond to and track leads from BeAScout.org inquiries using "Invitation Manager" and processing online applications using "Application Manager".

Note: Adding individuals to Scout Book does not officially register an individual in Scouting, this must be done through processing an online application using "Invitation Manager" and "Application Manager".

Wood Badge



Wood Badge is advanced Scout leader training that began in 1919 by Lord Baden-Powell, founder of Scouting and Wood Badge's first director. It came to America in 1948 and has been updated to reflect current BSA policies and programs. Incorporating the best techniques available, Wood Badge has become the most advanced leadership training course in Scouting!

Wood Badge is the highest level of Scout leadership training and provides you with the tools to be a superior leader. The leadership skills taught are for leaders from all Scouting areas including Cub Scouting, Scouts BSA, Venturing and the district and council. The 1st half of the course utilizes a classroom environment and practical exercises to teach the essentials of leadership. You'll learn what makes leadership work for you in Scouting and your personal life. The 2nd half offers classroom and outdoor experiences to help you learn the application of leadership skills. Finally, you will write and complete a "Ticket". The "Ticket" consists of five written goals. These goals connect your new leadership knowledge to your role in Scouting.

Any Scouter who has attended basic training for their registered position and serves in a leadership role in Scouting or in a position that directly supports a unit can attend.
