

Unit Award











Event Planning

Wood Badge Planning

- 1. Prepare a project overview that summarizes the specific goals and objectives of the project
- 2. Develop a work breakdown structure that identifies the tasks to be completed and order in which they should be done
- 3. Assign responsibilities for specific activities or task to each project team member
- 4. Put the plan into action and track its progress
- 5. Prepare a closeout report that compares the original goals and objectives to the outcome



Requirement 2 (Form BSA 430-16)

2a. Our troop conducted 10 outdoor trips or activities with at least 50 percent of the registered youth participating. Yes / No

Requirement 3 (Form BSA 430-16)

 Troop attended long-term resident camp or a local/national high-adventure experience of at least six days/five nights. "Yes" / "No"

Requirement 4 (Form BSA 430-16)

 The troop conducted at least one outing with a Webelos Scout den. "Yes" / "No"





Requirement 5 (Form BSA 430-16)

 The troop earned at least one outdoors-related* merit badge per Scout. "Yes" / "No"

Outdoor Merit Badges

Archery, Astronomy, Athletics, Backpacking, Bird Study, Camping, Canoeing, Climbing, Cooking, Cycling, **Emergency Preparedness, Environmental Science,** Farm Mechanics, First Aid, Fish and Wildlife Management, Fishing, Fly-Fishing, Forestry, Geocaching, Geology, Hiking, Horsemanship, Kayaking, Landscape Architecture, Lifesaving, Motorboating, Nature, Oceanography, Orienteering, Pioneering, Rifle Shooting, Rowing, Safety, Scuba, Shotgun Shooting, Skating, Small-Boat Sailing, Snow Sports, Soil and Water Conservation, Sports, Sustainability, Swimming, Water Sports, Whitewater, Wilderness Survival.



Requirement 6 (Form BSA 430-16)

 The troop conducted at least one Leave No Trace program during the calendar year for a minimum of 50 percent of the members. Yes / No

National Outdoor Badge for

Camping

1.Earn (one of the following):

- Scouts BSA First Class rank
- Sea Scout Apprentice rank, or
- Venturing Ranger (complete requirements 1–6.)



2. Complete the Camping merit badge requirements.

3. Complete the requirements for two of the following three:

- Cooking merit badge or Ranger Cooking core;
- First Aid merit badge or Ranger First Aid core;
- Pioneering merit badge.



National Outdoor Badge for Camping

4.Complete 25 days and nights of camping—including *((but not limited to))* six consecutive days (five nights) of camping including nights camped as part of requirements 1 through 3 above at 25 nights at a BSA accredited resident camp.

Gold device may be earned for each additional 25 nights of camping.

Silver device is earned for each additional 100 nights of camping.





National Outdoor Badge for

Hiking

- 1. Earn (one of the following):
 - Scouts BSA First Class rank
 - Sea Scout Apprentice rank, or
 - Venturing Ranger (complete requirements 1–6.)



- 2. Complete the requirements for the Hiking merit badge, Backpacking merit badge, or Venturing Ranger Backpacking elective
- 3. Complete the requirements for one of the following: Orienteering merit badge, Geocaching merit badge, or Venturing Ranger Land Navigation core requirement.
- 4. Complete 100 miles of hiking or backpacking under the auspices of the Boy Scouts of America, including miles hiked as part of requirement 2.



National Outdoor Badge for Hiking

Gold device may be earned for each additional 50 miles hiked, backpacked, snowshoed, or skied as outlined in requirements 2 and 3.

Silver device is earned for each additional 200 miles of hiking. The youth may wear any combination of devices totaling his or her current number of miles hiking.








National Outdoor Badge for

Aquatics

- 1. Earn (one of the following):
 - Scouts BSA First Class rank
 - Sea Scout Apprentice rank, or
 - Venturing Ranger (complete requirements 1–6.)



3. Earn the Mile Swim BSA Award





National Outdoor Badge for Aquatics

4. Compete requirements for at least one of the following merit badges:

Canoeing, Fishing, Fly-Fishing, Kayaking, Rowing, Scuba Diving, Small-Boat Sailing, Water Sports, or Whitewater merit badges or Ranger Award Fishing, Scuba or Watercraft electives.

Complete at least **25 hours** of on-the-water time, applying the skills that you learned in the merit badge or Ranger elective.



National Outdoor Badge for Aquatics

• 5. Complete at least 50 hours of any combination of swimming, canoeing, fishing, fly-fishing, kayaking, rowing, scuba, small-boat sailing, stand up paddleboarding, water sports, or whitewater activity under the auspices of the Boy Scouts of America, including time spent in requirements 2 through 4.



National Outdoor Badge for Aquatics (Cont)

Devices:

- A gold device may be earned for each additional 25 hours of aquatics activity listed in requirement 5.
- A **silver device** is earned for each additional 100 hours of aquatics activity. The youth may wear any combination of devices totaling his or her current number of hours of aquatics activity.






National Outdoor Badge for

Conservation

1. Earn the Scouts BSA First Class rank, Sea Scout Apprentice rank, or complete Venturing Ranger Award reqts 1-6.



Complete the requirements for the following: a. Environmental Science merit badge or Sustainability merit badge or both Venturing Ranger Conservation core and Ecology elective; b. Soil and Water Conservation merit badge; c. One of the following merit badges: Fish and Wildlife Management, Forestry, or Mammals



National Outdoor Badge for Conservation

4. Complete 25 hours of conservation work under the auspices and standards of Scouting America, including hours worked as part of requirements 1 through 3.



National Outdoor Badge for Conservation

Devices:

- A gold device may be earned for each additional 25 hours of conservation work.
- A silver device is earned for each additional 100 hours of conservation work
- For example, the first silver device is earned at 125 total hours of conservation work). Youth may wear any combination of devices totaling his or her current number of hours of conservation work.





National Outdoor Badge for

Riding

- 1. Earn the First Class rank, Sea Scout Apprentice rank, *or* complete Venturing Ranger Award requirements 1-6.
- 2. Complete the requirements for at least one,
 - Cycling merit badge or Ranger Cycling/Mountain Biking elective and 100 miles of cycling
 - Horsemanship merit badge or Ranger Equestrian elective and 20 miles of horseback riding
 - Motorboating merit badge or Ranger Watercraft elective and 100 miles of motor boating
 - Skating merit badge or Ranger Winter Sports elective and 20 miles of skating





National Outdoor Badge for Riding

3. Complete 200 miles of riding activities, including cycling, stock riding, skating, motor boating, mountain boarding, (including ATV or PWC riding at an approved council program), under the auspices of the Boy Scouts of America, including the miles in requirement 2.



National Outdoor Badge for Riding

Devices:

- A gold device may be earned for each additional 100 miles of riding set forth in requirement 3.
- A silver device is earned for each additional 400 miles of riding.

 The youth may wear any combination of devices totaling his or her current number of miles of riding





1. Earn the Scouts BSA First Class rank, Sea Scout Apprentice rank, *or* complete Venturing Ranger Award requirements 1-6.



CONSERVATION



2. Complete the requirements for:

Wilderness Survival, Search and Rescue, or Emergency Preparedness merit badge.



or Ranger Wilderness Survival core, Ranger Emergency Preparedness core, or Ranger First Aid elective.



- 3. Complete 10 activities of any combination or repetition of the following adventure activities, under the auspices of the Scouting America:
- a) Backpacking
- b) Water Trekking
- c) White Water Trekking
- d) Climbing
- e) National Historic Trails Award

- f) 50-Miler Award
- g) High Adventure Base
 - National
 - Council

















Devices:

- A gold device may be earned for each additional five activities.
- A silver device is earned for each additional 20 activities.
- The Scout may wear any combination of devices totaling his current number of activities.





- Troop 1 attends the historic Northern Tier Canoe Country and spends 6 days and 5 nights canoe trekking over 84 miles by water and foot. Participants spent approximately 8 hours a day on the water.

- 1. Earn the Scouts BSA First Class rank, Sea Scout Apprentice rank, or complete Venturing Ranger Award requirements 1-6 and hold the Venturing Discovery Award.
- 2. Earn the National Outdoor Badge for Camping with a silver device.
- **3. Earn** any two additional National Outdoor Badges, each with two gold devices.








4. Complete the requirements for all of the following: Backpacking merit badge or Ranger Backpacking elective; Emergency Preparedness merit badge or Ranger Emergency Preparedness core; Nature merit badge; and Wilderness Survival merit badge or Ranger Wilderness Survival core.





5. Complete a 16-hour course in Wilderness First Aid from the American Red Cross, Wilderness Medical Institute, or other recognized provider.









 6. Become a Leave No Trace Trainer by completing the 16-hour training course from a recognized Leave No Trace Master Educator.





7. Plan and lead, with the approval of your unit leader, an outing for your troop, team, ship, crew patrol, or squad in two of the following activity areas:



Hiking or Backpacking



Riding or Cycling



Aquatics





- 8. Complete at least one of the following:
- **a**. Plan and lead, with the approval of your unit leader, an adventure activity identified in the National Outdoor Badge for Adventure for your troop, ship, crew, or patrol.
- b. Successfully complete a season on a council summer camp staff in an outdoor area, such as aquatics, Scoutcraft, nature/environment, climbing, or COPE
