






Philmont Scout Ranch

- Creeks offer challenging smallstream trout "hunting"
- Fish are small and wary; subdued colored clothing and extreme stealth required!
- Most streams are catch-and-release









Florida Sea Base

- 9 programs from 3 locations
- Fishing is a major part of most programs
- Fly fishing is popular but not formally offered
 - Participants bring their own gear
- Large variety of saltwater fish available

- Focus on Canoeing Treks
 - -Wilderness camping
 - -Navigation
 - Many challenge levels
- Lots of Fishing Opportunities
 - –Large variety of conditions & fish







Northern Tier Boundary Waters Canada Ely Lake Superior

- Matagamon serves as "outfitter"
 & provides experienced ranger
- Treks are tailored to you
 - What kind of fish do you want to catch?
 - What kind of waters do you prefer?
 - Combine hiking, canoeing, camping, fishing, etc.
- Be prepared to deal with Northwoods conditions: terrain, insects, bears, weather, etc.



Maine High Adventure Base




Shenandoah Area


Shenandoah National Park

- Wild Trout
- Small mountain streams
- Best hatches April & May
- Low & clear water starting June: time for terrestrials

Shenandoah River

- Smallmouth Bass
- North Fork: best from early May
- South Fork: 5 times as large as North Fork; best from mid June
- 150 miles of fishable river
- Recovering from major fish kill






Inshore Saltwater

Harkers Island & Point Lookout, NC

- Inshore and offshore saltwater fishing
 - False Albacore, Bluefish, Dolphin, Redfish, Wahoo, Sailfish, etc.
- Primitive waterfront camping (\$15/night/tent incl. firewood)
- Hiking trails
- Sea Kayaking
- Summer Camps
 - Cape Lookout Environmental Education Center (CLEEC)
- Wild ponies on Shackleford Banks



Harkers Island at Cape Lookout, NC




Be Prepared - Plan For Success

Getting Ready


- Select the right gear

- Reconnoiter the territory




When Are You Going?

Consider:


- Water

East Coast Mayfly Hatch Periods




Check Water Conditions: USGS Streamflow Charts




Typical Stream Information Fredericksburg, VA (Mar 06 – Feb 07)


USGS 01668000 RAPPAHANNOCK RIVER NEAR FREDERICKSBURG, VA








Fish Temperature Preferences



- Small Tackle Box or Bag
- Flies, Lures, etc.
- Hooks
- Weights


- Cord Stringer
- Forceps, Pliers
- Floats or Strike Indicators
- Swivels
- Small Repair Kit
 - Super Glue
 - Light Wire or Size A Thread
 - Fingernail Polish
- Filet Knife w/ Sheath

Gear should be:

- Matched to fish & conditions
- Easily packed & carried
- Durable

- Adaptable to changes in conditions
- Easily Repaired
- OK to Lose or Break



Catch & Release

- Keep only what you'll eat at the next meal
- Know your seasons avoid spawning fish
- Use strong line don't overtire the fish
- Have your camera & release pliers ready
- Give up the lure or fly
- Use sharp, barbless hooks
- Handle them gently
 - Best Don't remove from the water
 - 2nd Best Use a fine-mesh rubber net
 - 3rd Best Wet hands & hold upside down
 - Support the delicate belly & avoid the gills
- Get 'em back in the water quickly

Bead-Head Wooly Bugger



- Hook 4X long streamer, size 4 10
- Thread black
- Tail black or olive marabou
- Body olive or black chenille
- Hackle medium olive or black saddle, palmered through body
- Head (optional) brass bead

Note: Additional colors include olive/brown, brown and tan

Selecting a (Fly) Rod

- Match to Fish & Conditions
 - Weight (000 to 15)
 - Length 5-15 feet
 - Action (full, mid or tip)
 - Delicacy vs. Power
 - Quality (blank, fittings, craftsmanship)
 - Transportation (number of pieces)
- Consult an experienced fly fisher
- Make your own
