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

By and large that is the reason we have an Eagle Scout Board of Review. We can assess and determine through the interview with the Scout whether or not the program is delivering the promise of Scouting and achieving its goals of helping make young people of character, good citizens, that are physically fit. Along with all of that, do they make ethical choices and does it look like they will do the same in the future?

Reflection is an important part of everything that we do in Scouting. It allows us to take a look back and see if we achieved the outcomes we want in playing our game.

Reflection comes in many forms, we can do it as a group or take time in silent reflection. But no activity is complete until the reflection is done.

This last weekend our Troop went camping. First winter camp out of the year and we went caving on Saturday exploring the largest Lava tube cave in the US. It is adventurous and challenging and our Scouts love to test themselves. As with most outings or activities a theme develops throughout the weekend. This weekend the theme quickly became "Rising to the Challenge". Overcoming hardship, attitudes, and things that make you uncomfortable were some of the behaviors that we noticed in our Scouts as they went through the

For some of the Scouts it was the first time they would camp in sub freezing temperatures. For some it was their first time in a cave. For others it was a leadership challenge as they learned that as a leader there were Scouts that depended on them to just get through the weekend. Cold weather, challenging experiences, and doing something new and difficult.

These young men learned and practiced great leadership. I was pleased to watch as members of the Patrol Leaders Council made their way through camp checking on the younger Scouts. Instructing them on how to get through the night. Reassuring younger Scouts that they will be ok and that if they do what they are taught, they will be warmer in the morning and will be able to have a better experience in winter camping.

I walked through camp Saturday night around 10:30 and found gear properly stored, tents pitched with all the tie outs in place and the sounds of tired happy Scouts sitting in their tents, the gentle glow of a headlamp lighting the green nylon of a tent fly.

Sunday morning leadership was once again challenged as cold fingers attempted to pack even colder nylon tents and sleeping bags. Our departure time was supposed to be 9:00 AM. We missed it by 20 minutes, but the reason was acceptable to me. The Troop was in Patrol lines taking a few minutes to share a few things they learned over the weekend. Patrol leaders talking with their patrols about the challenges they faced over the weekend and how they all rose to the challenge. Before we loaded up I shared with them my pride in them and how they are great young men. I shared with them the fact that they needed to reflect on the weekend and see just how much they learned about skills, their attitude, and how they grew because of the experience. The final question that I asked them to reflect on was this, Is there any place you would rather be?

When we got back to the hall and parents started arriving to pick up their Scouts, many of the Scouts came to me and shared the answer to that last question. Each and every one of them say "NO WHERE ELSE".

So reflecting back on this weekend I would say Promise Delivered and Program solid.

It is important to reflect. You may not always get the answer you want, that is your opportunity to learn and grow doing better next time. If things are going well... keep it that way! Don't let it slip.

Make sure that reflection time is a part of your program. Have the Scouts take time to reflect and have serious reflection on how they are doing in the Scouting program. It is a game with a purpose, without reflection, you will not know if that purpose is being met.

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Spring Camporee



The 2023 Goose Creek District Spring Camporee will occur at Camp Highroad, Middleburg VA, from Friday, April 14th to Sunday, April 16th, 2023. The Camporee Patrol Challenge theme is, "Outdoor Adventure Challenge." Scouts will earn up to 10 points at each Patrol Challenge station, plus 10 points for patrol flags & yell and 10 more for skit performances at campfire.

The Camporee consists of two major events followed by evening campfire. The first is a Patrol Challenge of six events, held in the morning and again in the afternoon on Saturday. Patrols will compete and earn points at each Challenge station. The second is an Adventure Choice period, also held in morning/afternoon sessions, for Scouts to be able to explore challenging "High Adventure" program activities that interest them. Each Unit will have assigned periods, one session in the morning and the other session in the afternoon, so that all participants have equal opportunity for full participation.

Evening campfire will include skits and songs performed by the patrols.

This event is designed for Scouts BSA Troops and Venturing Crews.

MANDATORY Merit Badge Counselor Training



Reminder - All Merit Badge Counselors are required by NCAC to complete the online BSA training for MBCs, available at the training part of *my.scouting.org*. If you haven't completed this training by year-end 2022, your MBC status will not be renewed for 2023. It's important info, but actually only takes about 30 minutes of your time to complete. Please check your training records - if you've completed live MBC training (course D76) or done the four virtual modules (SCO_471, 472, 474 and 486), you should be all set. If you're not sure you've completed the training, you can check your my.scouting.org training profile, or send Rich Pender your name and BSA ID (*meritbadgedean@goosecreekdistrict.org*), and he can check the District training records.

As of December 30, 150 Goose Creek MBCs still need to complete this training, or their status as MBCs will not be renewed

If you are a Life-to-Eagle Adviser or Advancement Chair for your Unit and have <u>not</u> attended one of these in Goose Creek within the last 2 years, you really should make an attempt to do so.

Hiking Merit Badge Requirements Update



Several requirement changes have been approved to the Hiking merit badge These will become effective on January 1, 2023.

Requirement 2

Requirement 2 has been expanded into three parts, to allow Scouts to thoroughly demonstrate an understanding of the importance of good hiking practices and etiquette. It now includes more emphasis on Leave No Trace and the Outdoor Code, which are core principles of Scouting and should be introduced and reviewed when beginning to work on this merit badge:

2. Do the following:

- a. Explain and, where possible, show the points of good hiking practices including proper outdoor ethics, hiking safety in the daytime and at night, courtesy to others, choice of footwear, and proper care of feet and footwear.
- b. Read aloud or recite the Leave No Trace guidelines, and discuss why each is important while hiking.
- c. Read aloud or recite the Outdoor Code, and give examples of how to follow it on a hike.

Requirement 4

After reviewing feedback from the field and discussions from both merit badge counselors and professional organization representatives, requirements 4 and 5 were merged and updated. The new requirement has Scouts complete four 10-mile hikes and one 20-mile hike, as opposed to the previous one 5-mile, three 10-mile, and one 15-mile hike. It has also been written for clarity.

4. Take four 10-mile hikes and one 20-mile hike, each on a different day, and each of continuous miles. Prepare a written hike plan before each hike and share it with your merit badge counselor or a designee for approval before starting the hike. Include map routes, a clothing and equipment list, and a list of items for a trail lunch. You may stop for as many short rest periods as needed, as well as one meal, during each hike, but not for an extended period such as overnight.

Requirement 5

Requirement 6 became requirement 5 and replaced the word "reflection" with "report" as some Scouts may be unclear about what is meant by a "reflection", but are more likely to know what is expected in a report. Additionally, it clarifies what should be included for each hike, not just a final report of all.

5. After each of the hikes (or during each hike if on one continuous "trek") in requirement 4, write a short report on your hike. For each hike, give the date and description (or map) of the route covered, the weather, any interesting things you saw, and any challenges you had and how you overcame them. It may include something you learned about yourself, about the outdoors, or about others you were hiking with. Share this with your merit badge counselor.

We Need More District Eagle Representatives



Goose Creek District currently only has five District Eagle Representatives (DER), three of whom are in the Sterling area. We need more, especially in South Riding, Ashburn, and western Loudoun.

What does a DER do?

- Provides the final approval for Eagle Scout Project Proposals. The DER
 ensures that the project meets the standards for an Eagle Project and
 more importantly, talks to the Scout about the planning and leadership
 requirements of the project. The DER will also go over with the Scout
 about the entire Eagle process, from requirements still needed to filling in
 the Eagle Scout Rank Application and what to expect at the Eagle Board
 of Review.
- Represents the Council at an Eagle Board of Review.

What does it take to be a DER?

There are no set requirements to be a DER but people interested usually have several years of experience with a troop as either a Scoutmaster, ASM, or committee member. We also ask that they attend one of our Life to Eagle Training seminars, which goes over the minutae of the Eagle process that they will have to be familiar with, and to sit down with the District Advancement Chair for a short, philosophical discussion of the process.

Scout Sunday, Scout Shabbat, and Scout Jumuah




Scouts try their best to live by the 12 points of the Scout Law seven days a week, 365 days a year. But each February, around the time of the BSA's birthday, we ask our Scouts to pause and pay extra attention to the Scout law's finishing touch: reverent.


Through the celebrations known as Scout Sunday, Scout Sabbath and Scout Jumuah, Scouts take a moment to reflect on their faith. Every unit can celebrate Scout Sunday, Scout Sabbath and/or Scout Jumuah as they choose. But the occasions are especially important for Scout units supported by faith-based chartered organizations.



In those units, the celebrations offer a great opportunity to give back in a public way. That could mean wearing the full field uniform to worship services, where the worship leader presents religious awards to Scouts and Scouters. It could mean participating in the service by distributing programs, greeting guests, or leading a song or prayer. Or it could mean a daylong pack, troop, ship or crew service project that benefits the religious organization.

When is Scout Sunday 2023?







Scout Shabbat 2023 is Feb. 10, 2023, according to the BSA's Calendar of Religious Observances and the National Jewish Committee on Scouting. Scout Shabbat (also called Scout Sabbath) is the Jewish observance of the significance of religion in Scouting. It begins at sundown on Friday, and continues into the next day.

Though the National Jewish Committee on Scouting has designated Feb. 10 as Scout Sabbath for 2023, some councils or units will celebrate the occasion on other days. Be sure to check with your council or local Jewish Committee on Scouting to verify the date.

When is Scout Jumuah 2023?

Scout Jumuah 2023 is Feb. 10, 2023, but units may adjust this date to best meet their needs. Scout Jumuah (sometimes stylized as Scout Jumu'ah) is the Islamic observance of the significance of religion in Scouting. It lasts from sundown on Thursday, Feb. 9, to sundown on Friday, Feb. 10. Scout Jumuah offers a chance to recognize the contributions of young people and adults to Scouting within the Muslim community.

Cub Scout Weekend Resident Camp at Camp Snyder, Haymarket VA



Cub Resident Camp is your bite sized introduction to a Boy Scout summer camp program. The importance of Cub Resident camp to a registered Cub Scout and their family is tremendous! Resident Camp will develop your son's or dens' self-reliance and resourcefulness by providing learning experiences in which campers acquire knowledge, skills, and attitudes essential to their well-being.
