

High School Figure Skating FAQ

What is High School Skating?

Similar to collegiate skating, the high school program offers skaters the opportunity to compete on a team for their high school. Several states host a high school series and a state final, and any high school team is eligible to enter the U.S. FIGURE SKATING National High School Cyber Challenges or Sectional High School Finals.

How do I start a high school skating team?

Two skaters are required to start a team; skaters can either represent a single school or a combination of several area schools. To form a team, we encourage students to get approval from their high school, then complete team registration on Members Only and pay the yearly team dues.

How much does it cost to start a team?

The U.S. Figure Skating High School Team dues fee is \$35 to register. Additional fees for a team might include competition fees, practice ice time, optional coaching fees, travel, and team apparel.

Can we combine local high schools to form one team? Or must skaters compete only for their high school?

Athletes may compete either for the high school they are attending, or high school collaborative, defined as follows:

- Athletes from a single school, representing that school, OR
- Athletes representing two or more area high schools combining to form a single team.

NOTE: Competitors may not represent more than ONE high school team at the same time.



What skaters are eligible to compete on high school skating teams? Can home school skaters compete?

All skaters must be enrolled as a full-time student as defined by the institution that they attend, grades 9-12, as per state guidelines. This includes both traditional and home school students. Skaters must be eligible members in good standing of U.S. Figure Skating or Learn to Skate USA and may be members of the figure skating club of their choice or be individual members of U.S. Figure Skating.

Does a team require a coach?

No. We encourage student athlete support and leadership within the team. A coach is optional and a team's decision.

Is there a minimum skate test required to compete at high school events?

All levels are welcome! Event offerings for high school teams can range from Beginner all the way up to Senior. Some events may have test restrictions. Please refer to the event requirements for details regarding test restrictions.

Do I need to have a current membership to join?

Yes, anyone skating on a high school team should have current Learn to Skate USA® or U.S. Figure Skating membership.

When is the high school skating season?

Typically, competitions will run October through April. Although, high school competitions can take place even during the summer! Competition offerings will vary depending on where you are located.

What events are offered at high school skating competitions?

Typically, events are offered in a variety of disciplines, including short program, free skate, solo dance (pattern and free dances), compulsory, showcase, and team maneuvers.

Will I miss school to compete at these events?

Athletes participating in these events are student-athletes. Their education is of the highest priority, and in all decision-making matters, the Program & New Program



Development Committee and the local organizing committees (LOC) have a responsibility to minimize the days missed from school.

Are there national virtual or in-person competition that I can participate in?

Yes. The National High School Cyber Challenge will be held January through April. New this year, High School Skating is exploring the opportunity to hold Sectional High School Finals, which are tentatively being scheduled for Spring 2024. More information will be available soon regarding dates and host sites. All registered teams will be eligible to participate in these events.

Can I attend high school competitions in other states?

Yes.

NOTE: Some states run competition series that are limited to in-state teams. It is recommended to check competition announcements for specific eligibility requirements.

What states have a high school skating competition series?

To date there are competition series hosted in Michigan, Illinois, Wisconsin, Colorado, New England, and Ohio.

Can I host a nonqualifying high school skating competition?

Yes. You have two options: hosting an independent non-qualifying competition or adding high school-specific events onto an already existing non-qualifying competition. For more information, please contact Chloe Roberts (croberts@usfigureskating.org) or Waverly Huston (waverlyhuston@gmail.com).

How do I apply for a sanction for a high school skating competition?
