## THE PROBLEM

- Many aspects of current licensing requirements have less to do with qualifying teachers in their subjects or classroom management and more to do with ideological gatekeeping and ever-evolving progressive pedagogy techniques.
- Would-be teachers are indoctrinated with bad ideas, both political (such as gender ideology or critical race theory) and pedagogical, when states mandate education degrees and/or certification programs for licensure.
- Many of our current licensure requirements are the result of both ideological and professional centralization, both of which have made our school systems worse.

## THE WAY FORWARD

Cutting red tape and decentralizing education not only allows for more teachers, but it allows for better teachers.

- Focus on Subject-Matter Exams: States should emphasize high-quality teacher licensure exams, especially in math and science, over education degrees or credentials like master's degrees.
- Expand the Teaching Force by Relaxing Degree Requirements: More states should emulate approaches taken by states like <a href="Louisiana">Louisiana</a>, which allows people with associate's degrees in a subject to teach while pursuing a bachelor's in education. This allows states to fill shortages and teachers to get more from their bachelor's degrees, as they are studying and working at the same time.
- Open the Profession to Second-Career Teachers: States can pursue policies like <u>Virginia's</u>, which has a career switcher program for experienced professionals who meet certain exam and training requirements.
- **Establish Licensure Reciprocity:** States should expand interstate licensure reciprocity to minimize burdens for good teachers who are moving between states and to give states access to a broader pool of talent.
- Excise Ideology From Teacher Licensure: States should use their authority to ensure that the teacher training programs they are relying on are not spreading pernicious and partisan ideologies in the teaching profession.

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
