

2022 National BSA Fee Structure

NCAC Volunteers,

Summer Camp is in full swing and I hope all those who have participated in a Scouting adventure this summer have had a fantastic time! Thank you for the leadership you provide to deliver the Scouting program in National Capital Area Council.

Last week the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America announced an increase to the national membership fee structure. To ensure the Boy Scouts of America has the resources to fulfill the promise of Scouting, the following structure will take effective **August 1st, 2022.**

2022 Membership Fee infographic

\$75 for Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouts participants

\$45 for Exploring participants

\$45 for all adult volunteers (includes cost of background check)

\$100 for a unit charter/affiliation fee

\$25 one-time joining fee for new program participants in Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing and Sea Scouts (Not pro-rated)

\$15 for Scout Life magazine; this is the first price increase since 2005

Over many years, the Boy Scouts of America has worked diligently to keep all membership fees as low as possible. As you know, costs continue to rise, and the annual fee must be increased to address the fiscal realities we face to deliver a safe and quality Scouting program. The outlined membership fees cover the cost of essential services provided by the National Council in Irving Texas which include; program resources, liability insurance for those participating in approved Scouting activities, criminal background checks, youth protection, and the development of intellectual property used throughout the movement. All membership registration fees are collected to support the operation of the National Council.

Our local Council, National Capital Area Council, does not retain any of the above referenced fees, when members register or renew their membership with the Boy Scouts of America. As we continue forward, the membership fee structure continues to be evaluated and how we deliver the Scouting program for future generations.

Thank you for all you are doing to positively impact the lives of thousands of Scouts and their families through Scouting in National Capital Area Council.

2023 Charter Renewal Process Has begun for NCAC and George Mason District Units

Enter Link to 2023 Charter Renewal Handbook here

Every Unit Key 3 (COR, Committee Chair and Unit Leader) should take the time and review this Handbook to understand the Recharter process, the timeline and what their part is in the 2023 Recharter Process. Unit Committee members should also review the handbook to understand this process.

2023 Unit Recharter Timeline

- 1 August 30 September 2022 Units collect and validate recharter Data and collect BSA registration fee
- 1 October 2022 Units begin to input recharter data into online system
- 24 October 2022 Units should have completed entering Charter Renewal data and submit to council
- 24 Oct 24 Nov 2022 Commissioners/NCAC work with Units to address issues found during submission process
- 31 December 2022 Current 2022 unit charter expires
- 1 January 2023 Units without new charters posted become lapsed units and lose the ability to accept or process On-line Applications for new members or for transfers in or out
- 1 March 2022 Units without new 2023 charters posted become dropped units and members lose access to records in my.scouting.org and Scoutbook – members and units are no longer part of BSA. Units loose BSA insurance coverage.

The Following is from Chapter One of the 2023 Charter Renewal Handbook:

UNIT INFORMATION

This year the Boy Scouts of America is introducing new Rechartering software. It will be effective for all units that have a charter expiration date of 31 December 2021 or later. The new program will be part of Internet Advancement and will not require an access code to use it; however, it will be only accessible to those members of the unit who are part of the Key 3 or have been designated as a Key 3 Delegate. As you work through the recharter system, the software will alert you to inconsistencies in your data. All warnings and errors will have a pop-up notice. If it's an error, it would also be a blocker, so a notice would keep you from proceeding. A warning will only have a pop-up appear letting you know something will need to be further addressed. If help is needed with warnings or errors, contact the District Renewal Expert for assistance.

Below is information that is extremely important to the Committee Chair and Unit Leader about what needs to be done to complete the Internet Advancement Renewal process for their unit this year.

RECHARTER PROCESS

The recharter process is broken down into two parts – The **Data Collection** phase and the **Data Input** phase. There are specific processes required in each phase and neither is more important than the other. In fact, the Data Input phase cannot be done without the Data Collection phase being completed first.

For the **Data Collection** Phase, the following processes need to be completed:

- review Chapter One of the Council Charter Renewal Handbook
- conduct a Membership Inventory comparing the roster from my.scouting.org to your unit roster, identify Scouts who are not returning and reason why along with adults who are not returning and identify adults and Scouts from the unit's roster that do not appear on the official my.scouting.org roster and submit applications for them along with the appropriate fees (waiting to submit the applications with the recharter application will NOT get them on your current year roster)
- with the assistance of the Charter Organization Representative (CR), select leaders for the next charter year
- with Unit Leader (UL) assistance, select direct contact leaders for the next charter year and have them approved by the CR
- identify the unit Renewal Processor (RP) team
- attend the District Charter Renewal training
- ensure the unit is properly coded (especially for Packs (Boy Pack (BP) or Family Pack (FP))
- identify volunteers with expired YPT or YPT that will expire before 1 May of the new charter year
- identify a committee member to collect the registration and Scout Life magazine fees for recharter

While the above task may seem daunting, they can be completed in the two months leading up to the Data Input phase and will reduce the overall effort needed to complete it. As the Cub Scout and Scouts BSA mottos say "Do Your Best" and "Be Prepared."

Important Dates for Units

The most important dates for units to remember are:

- ❖ 1 August 30 September Data Collection part and registration fee collection
- August September Submit applications for new members and for leader position changes
- 1 October Data Input part begins
- 24 October NLT date for completed Charter Renewal files to be submitted to council
- 31 December Current unit charter expires
- 1 January Units without new charters posted become lapsed units and lose the ability to accept or process On-line Applications for new members or for transfers in or out
- 1 March Units without new charters posted become dropped units and members lose access to records in my.scouting.org and Scoutbook – members and units are no longer part of BSA

While units are only focused on their own charter renewal packets, the District Rep can be responsible for any number of charters ranging from 30 to over 100 and the Council is focusing on almost 1,000 charters to get processed and posted before 31 December. By working on your Data Collection and Data Input parts and completing them early so your charter can get turned in on-time will greatly decrease the chances that your unit will become a lapsed unit or worse a dropped unit. The Committee Chair is responsible for the consequences of a unit becoming a Lapsed Unit or a Dropped Unit.

2022 Journey to Excellence – NEW INFO from BSA

Journey to Excellence is the Boy Scouts of America program to help Packs, Troops, Crews, Ships and Posts to plan, monitor and evaluate their performance and their ability to serve youth. There are specific criteria for the unit to plan and accomplish. These standards are reviewed each year and revised standards are published.

The 2022 Journey to Excellence Standards are now available.

Here are the major changes in the JTE scorecards for 2022.

- 1. The standards are written as activities that the unit <u>will</u> do. This is to emphasize that JTE is primarily a planning tool.
- 2. The Cub Scout scorecard has many changed standards. This is because of changes in the Cub Scout program.
- 3. For standard #10, Gold now includes recruiting a new leader. We have found that the best units continually recruit parents and other adults who have never been involved in Scouting.

There is no requirement, no expectation and, in fact, we might discourage a unit from believing that they should achieve Gold in all JTE criteria. A great unit is balanced in the service that it provides to youth. There is no shame and no problem if a unit achieves Silver or Bronze. That unit is serving youth. We regard the various colors as meaning:

Bronze – Effective Silver – Excellent Gold – Exceptional

V3 HIKE-O-REE October 28-30, 2022

The **32nd** Annual V3 (originally named for Venturing, Varsity, and Venture) Hike-o-ree will be held October 28-30, 2022, at the Northern Virginia 4-H Educational Center, Front Royal, VA. Registration is limited to trail capacities of the fifteen trails. The Hike-o-ree is open to all **Venturing Crews**, **Sea Scout Ships**, **and Scouts BSA Troops**. Units must form trail crews consisting of no more than 12 members, including at least two adults. If a unit has more than 12 simply form another crew (with proper adult leadership). The **minimum age to participate is 13**.

BSA units will need to comply with the Guide to Safe Scouting, etc., and meet the safety requirements therein. All BSA Scouts and <u>Scouters</u> that hike must bring a current BSA Annual Health and Medical Record, parts A, and B, and meet the weight limits on part C.

Trail crews will be assigned a hike based on the preferences indicated in their registration. All hikes are approximately ten miles in length and range in difficulty from moderate (1500 foot change in elevation) to super strenuous (2600 foot change in elevation). Other Hike-o-ree activities include a Friday night opening rally, a Saturday night **High Adventure Rally**, and a service project on Sunday morning. Crews receive their Hike-o-ree t-shirts Saturday night.

The Hike-o-ree is intended to be an introduction to backpacking and shakedown. Therefore, camping at the 4-H Center is BACKPACKING style using ONLY backpacking equipment. Bring ONLY what you can carry in your backpack. Come prepared to cook outdoors; bring a trail tarp. Do not bring chuck boxes, coolers, Dutch ovens, propane tanks, camp lanterns, etc.!!

Registration on a **FIRST COME**, **FIRST SERVED BASIS begins on September 1**, **2022**, on the BSA National Capital Area Council website.

Unit deposit is required to reserve a particular hike **not later than October 7**, **2022**. After you register for a hike and pay your deposit, you will be sent a confirmation email with the leader's package and detailed information about the hike you have selected.

Because of the lead-time required to produce the t-shirts, the final date to provide shirt numbers and sizes (S, M, L, XL, 2XL) is **October 14. NO ADDITIONAL ORDERS CAN BE TAKEN AFTER THAT DATE.** Submit payment and final shirt orders online on BSA National Capital Area Council website.

Hike #1 - White Oak/Cedar Run Canyon Superstrenuous Elevation change: 3200 feet

Length: 9.7 miles Driving Distance (one way): 42.9 miles PATC Map: 10

This hike goes through two of the deepest and steepest ravines in the Shenandoah National Park. Both canyons have waterfalls, cascades and high cliffs.

Hike #2 - Robertson Mountain Superstrenuous Elevation change: 2884 feet

Length: 11.3 miles Driving Distance (one way): 34.8 miles PATC Map: 10

This trail follows a beautiful trout stream to an original mountaineer's cabin and finally over one of the least climbed mountains in the Shenandoah National Park. If you want a challenge, climb Robertson Mountain from the east.

Elevation change: 2490 feet Hike #3 - Overall Run

Length: 9.5 miles Driving Distance (one way): 15.6 miles PATC Map: 9

This hike follows trails that were farm roads in pre-park days and gives access to the Overall Run Falls. At 93 feet, it is the highest waterfall in the Shenandoah National Park.

Hike #4 - Little Devil's Stairs Elevation change: 2155 feet

Driving Distance (one way): 26.1 miles Length: 10.2 miles PATC Map: 9

Little Devil's Stairs Trail winds around and between the rocks in a canyon, crossing and recrossing Keyser Run many times. Be sure to stop and visit a graveyard dating back to the early 1800s.

Hike #5 - Thorofare Mountain Strenuous Elevation change: 2559 feet

Length: 9.5 miles Driving Distance (one way): 34.8 miles PATC Map: 10

This trail offers a waterfall, old farm roads that once connected the families in this area, two great swimming holes, and a restored mountaineer's cabin.

Hike #6 - Hazel Country Strenuous Elevation change: 2467 feet

Length: 9.9 miles Driving Distance (one way): 34.8 miles PATC Map: 10
The mountaineer has been gone for 50 years, but the few old houses, which remain standing, old apple orchards, the lonely chimneys, and

crude stone fences are evidence that he was here.

Hike #7 - Hazel Mountain Elevation change: 2365 feet Strenuous

Length: 10.25 miles Driving Distance (one way): 32 miles PATC Map: 10

This hike takes you into one of the most remote areas of the Shenandoah National Park and is recommended for crews who are map and compass experts. It offers a waterfall, a swimming hole and a cave.

Hike #8- Old Rag Strenuous Elevation change: 2423 feet

Length: 9.0 miles Driving Distance (one way): 35.0 miles PATC Map: 10

If you have never climbed "Old Raggedy Top", now's the time. This hike provides views in all directions, including a noble panorama of the mountains of the Shenandoah National Park.

Hike #9 - Jeremy's Run Moderate Elevation change: 2222 feet

Length: 10.0 miles Driving Distance (one way): 35.0 miles PATC Map: 9

Jeremy's Run is one of the most scenic streams in the Northern District of the Shenandoah National Park. The trail is beautifully forested and the run itself is a continual series of cascades and pools.

Hike #10 - Signal Knob Moderate Elevation change: 2770 feet

Length: 10.6 miles Driving Distance (one way): 15.4 miles PATC Map: G
Signal Knob was used by the Confederate forces during the Civil War to monitor movement of Federal troops. Excellent views are provided of the Shenandoah Valley.

Hike #11 - Thornton Hollow Length: 10.6 miles Moderate Elevation change: 2384 feet

Driving Distance (one way): 28.5 miles PATC Map: 9

This hike gives the backpacker a taste of the Appalachian Trail. It descends over Piney Ridge and climbs back up along the beautiful North Fork of the Thornton River.

Hike #12 – Piney Ridge/Piney Branch Moderate Elevation change: 1650 feet

Length: 9.4 miles Driving Distance (one way): 26.7 miles PATC Map: 9

Walk along a ridge where homes and farmlands once stood and see a spectacular view of a three tier waterfall. Offers two waterfalls and a

deep swimming hole.

Hike #13- Big Devil's Stairs Overlook Moderate Elevation change: 1300 feet

Length: 10.8 miles Driving Distance (one way): 12.2 miles PATC Map: 9

This hike slabs around the eastern and southern slopes of Mount Marshall and provides a side trek to the east rim of Big Devil's Stairs PATC Map: 9

offering spectacular views of Big Devil's Stairs canyon and the mountains beyond.

Hike #14 - Massanutten Mountain Moderate Elevation change: 2237 feet

Driving Distance (one way): 16.0 miles PATC Map: G Length: 9.1 miles

From the top of the ridge, there will be opportunities for superb views both east towards the mountains of the Shenandoah National Park and west into the Shenandoah Valley.

Hike #15 - Sugarloaf Trail Elevation change: 1876 feet Moderate

Length: 9.3 miles Driving Distance (one way): 25.4 miles PATC Map: 9

This trail uses both the Appalachian Trail and horse and foot trails that were farm roads in the pre-park days. It also offers two excellent viewing areas from the tops of Sugarloaf and Hogback Mountains.

Leave No Trace Trainer Course – Outdoor Ethics



Purpose of this Course

Participants in the Trainer Course learn Leave No Trace skills and ethics as well as techniques for educating others about these low impact practices. Research has shown that this course significantly improves participant knowledge and understanding of how Leave No Trace protects the outdoor places we love. The goal of this course is to teach students taking the course how to introduce the concept of Outdoor Ethics in a fun and engaging way to a group with little experience in outdoor ethics. It should help youth and adults at all program levels understand the general principles behind Scouting's outdoor ethics program. Graduates of a Trainer Course are prepared to lead Outdoor Ethics Orientation and BSA Leave No Trace 101 courses and to offer Leave No Trace Awareness Workshops to their community.

We recommend that youth complete this course before serving as in the troop Outdoor Ethics Guide position.

Who should attend?

This course will be of interest to any youth or registered Scouter who is associated with either implementing or training for any BSA outdoor program at any level. It is also well-suited for anyone who would like to pass on the knowledge of how to treat the outdoors and protect its beauty for others to enjoy. Youth must be at least 14 years old. Youth must be willing and able to conduct themselves appropriately for an adult training experience that is tightly scheduled and highly interactive.

TROOP UNIT LEADERS including COMMITTEE CHAIRMEN

As you prepare for your Unit's upcoming 2022-2023 program, we wanted to remind you of the requirements needed for a youth or adult to become an Order of the Arrow Ordeal **Candidate**.

Youth Membership Qualifications:

- 1. Be a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America.
- 2. At the time of their election, youth must be under the age of 21, hold the Scouts BSA First Class rank, the Venturing Discovery Award, or the Sea Scout Ordinary rank or higher, and following approval by the scoutmaster, crew advisor or Sea Scout skipper, be elected by the youth members of their unit.
- 3. The youth must have experienced **15 nights of camping** while registered with a troop, crew or ship within the two years immediately prior to the election. The **15** nights must include **one, but no more than one, long-term camp** consisting of at least five consecutive nights of overnight camping, approved and under the auspices and standards of the Boy Scouts of America. **Only five nights of the long-term camp may be credited toward the 15-night camping requirement**; the balance of the camping (10 nights) must be overnight, weekend, or other short-term camps of, at most, three nights each. Ship nights may be counted as camping for Sea Scouts.
- 4. Assistant scoutmasters who are 18, 19 or 20 years old are also considered to be youth members for the purpose of OA elections. All requirements shown above must be met for a young assistant scoutmaster to be eligible for election.

Prior to the annual election, the unit leader must certify the nominee's Scout spirit and youth membership qualifications. Voting for youth candidates will be based on their spirit of brotherhood, cheerfulness (no matter how tiresome their duties), and a willingness to give unselfish and wholehearted service to others at all times.

Adult Membership Qualifications:

Each year, upon holding a unit election for youth candidates that results in at least one youth candidate being elected, the unit committee may nominate registered unit adults, 21 years of age or older, to the lodge adult selection committee. The number of adults nominated can be no more than one-third of the number of youth candidates elected, rounded up where the number of youth candidates is not a multiple of three. In addition to the one-third limit, the unit committee may nominate the currently serving unit leader (but not assistant leaders), as long as he or she has served as unit leader for at least the previous 12 months. Recommendations of the adult selection committee, with the approval of the Scout executive, will be candidates for induction, provided the following conditions are fulfilled:

- 1. Selection of the adult is based on the ability to perform the necessary functions to help the Order fulfill its purpose and is not for recognition of service, including current and prior achievements and positions.
- 2. The individual will be an asset to the Order because of demonstrated abilities that fulfill the purpose of the Order.
- 3. The camping requirements set forth for youth members are fulfilled.
- 4. The adult leader's membership will provide a positive example for the growth and development of the youth members of the lodge.
