It's time to register! After over three years of planning, the Trout-o-Ree/Fish-O-Ree/Spring Camporee is here. It will take place on Friday, April 1, through Sunday, April 3, 2022, at Graves Mountain Farm and Lodge at 205 Graves Mountain Lane, Syria, Virginia 22743 (540) 923-4231. This is a joint camporee with Prince William and Patriot Districts, with Prince William District having the lead. The Trout-O-Ree flyer published by Prince William District is included in this issue of the Patriot Press on page 20.

Register online at https://scoutingevent.com/082-PWDTroutoree2022. The cost before March 28 is \$25 for Scouts and adults and \$30 for each after that date. The cost for Webelos Scouts and Webelos Scouts adults is \$5. Unfortunately, Webelos only can visit for the day – they cannot camp overnight. All Scout BSA unit leaders are asked to notify Pat Ring by email at pring978@gmail.com if they are attending the Trout-O-Ree or not. Units attending please give Pat an estimate of how many are attending. Units that do not plan to attend, please let us know so that we are not looking for you. Thanks.


The camporee program consists of fishing and fly fishing from steams and ponds. There will be instruction for Scouts learning how to fish on all aspects, including how to clean and cook a fish. The camporee is also sponsoring a fishing derby. Additionally, Scouts can participate in adventure activities such as archery, sling shot, the climbing wall, trebuchet firing, gaga ball, volleyball, and pancake flipping. (You get to eat the pancakes and it is free.)

Special note; All people fishing the main river, the Rose River, that are 16 years or older must have a fishing license with TROUT Stamp which can be purchased at most sporting goods stores or on-line at https://dgiflicense.virginianteractive.org. The Syria Mercantile sells licenses but the lines are very long so it is suggested that you purchase fishing licenses before you arrive.

Looking ahead to summer camping activities, please note that camperships are available. NCAC is committed to making sure that every Scout who wants to can attend a Cub Scout Day Camp or an overnight camp at Camp Goshen or Camp Snyder can do so. Every year, donors give funds through Friends of Scouting and the Endowment Fund to support scholarships for summer camp attendance. It can make a difference. Sixty years ago, the company my father worked for was in a merger, his position was eliminated, and he was let go. However, my younger brother and I were still able to go to Scout camp. The experience was memorable, and we both enjoyed ourselves. Years later, I learned from my mother that we attended on camperships. Looking forward to other live events coming up, we're holding our first-ever spring Scouts BSA recruiting event, called "#AdventureON 2022" at Burke Lake Park on March 20, from 2:00 to 5:00 PM. We will be heavily advertising it throughout the community between now and the 20th to reach Scouting-aged youth who are not already in the program, and of course we're looking forward to all our Webelos Scouts attending. It's a great opportunity to not only build enthusiasm about all the adventures that await them in Scouts BSA, but also gives them a head start in thinking about Troops they might want to join when they cross over next year. 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Scouter Interview: Bob Phillips

Patrick Ring

Bob Phillips is the Scoutmaster of Troop 1533G and was one of the 2021 Patriot District Outstanding Scoutmaster awardees. He was a 2021 National Outstanding Eagle Scout awardee for the NCAC. When he's not providing leadership for the Troop, Bob is the Director of the Center for Professionalism and Value in Health Care in Washington, DC, and a practicing family physician in Fairfax. His favorite Scouting activity is Pioneering, particularly building things with lashings.



Patrick Ring (PR): How and when did you first become involved in Scouting, and then later as Scoutmaster of Pack 1533G?

Bob Phillips (BP): I joined Scouting as a Cub Scout in Ft. Bliss, Texas, in 1977, where I enjoyed crossborder camporees with Scouts from Mexico. As my family moved with the military, I was fortunate to experience Scouting in Honolulu, Hawaii, and Ft. Leonard Wood, Missouri, where I earned my Eagle Rank in 1982. I became a Scout leader again during my two sons' Scouting careers, first as a Den Leader in Pack 1533 and then an Assistant Scoutmaster and Scoutmaster of 1533B. So it was no question, as Scouts BSA began to welcome girls, that I would help stand up our Girls Troop. Thankfully, I was joined by my wife, Kathy, and several other 1533B parents whose daughters wanted the same great Scouting experiences that their brothers had enjoyed. Seeing my daughter, Juliet, join her brothers as an Eagle Scout, and she and Kathy elected to Order of the Arrow, were wonderful moments.

PR: What are some challenges you faced as a Scoutmaster and how did you meet those challenges?

BP: Not everyone has been welcoming to girls in Scouts BSA, but the bigger issue has been raising awareness about language that is not inclusive but not intentional. Our young ladies responded by stepping up to challenges with pride. They came in second for troop honors in their first summer camp at Camp Olmstead in 2019, and this past year received top honors. My job as Scoutmaster has been to help coach changes in language to acknowledge that girls are part of Scouting. Rarely, I've called out slights as not fitting the Scout Law.

PR: Did you experience any surprises as Scoutmaster?

BP: Hearing regularly, "Dr. Phillips, we've got this." Girls generally have more executive function earlier than boys, so the adults have worked at pulling back to let the girls lead themselves and focus on coaching about Scouting principles and resources. It has made me a better Scouting adult leader.

PR: What has been your unit's recruiting experience and do you have any recruiting recommendations?

BP: Most of our recruiting success has been Scouts bringing friends. The girls are often drawn to our outdoor program and intrigued about the relatively new opportunity to be an Eagle Scout. The other main route has been through BeAScout and older girls looking for Troops for the same reasons. As we enter our fourth year, we finally have our first class of AOL Scouts visiting. Pack feeders and direct recruitment in elementary schools had been our lifeline in the Boys Troop, but it has not been that yet for the Girls Troop.

PR: Do you have any tips for a new Scoutmaster?

BP: My two main tips are: (1) Coach, don't solve – help the girls prepare for success but avoid the temptation to solve their problems; (2) recruit other adult leaders into specific coaching roles and model tip #1 for them.

PR: What are some of your most memorable experiences as a Scouter?

BP: Eagle Scout ceremonies, to be sure, but I also treasure each instance of a Scout smiling after a successful leadership moment and each squeal of pure joy – on a river, a rock face, or around a campfire.

PR: Is there anything else you would like to share with fellow Patriot District Scouters?

BP: I am grateful to be part of a group of adults who, despite considerable challenges over the last few years, are working to keep Scouting alive and well. I believe that now, more than ever, Scouting is one of the best programs for helping youth become good citizens and valuable leaders. Registered female Scouters remain a precious resource in Scouts BSA, and I hope we can focus on helping them feel welcome and respected.

Friends of Scouting Campaign Status – March 5, 2022



As Patriot District Committee Chairman, I am responsible for the Friends of Scouting (FOS) campaign for our District. In this letter I want to give you my personal views. I believe in Scouting in NCAC, and I understand that organizations need funds to operate. I feel I must lead by example and last December 2021, I made the first pledge in the name of Patriot District for the 2022 Campaign.

I believe NCAC is a good steward of our funds. During the previous two years, Council reduced their expenditures to conserve resources. Additionally, Scouters and Scout families continued to generously support NCAC with donations to the Friends of Scouting Campaigns and to the Endowment Fund. NCAC also applied for and received over \$1.8 million in government pandemic relief funding to support continuing operations. All of these funds were used to maintain a strong Scouting program in the National Capital area.

At our last Council wide Key 3 meeting, we declared, "We are ready to move from Survive mode back to Thrive mode". At Council level and in Patriot District we are on the go. The last District event before the pandemic was the district level Pinewood Derby in March 2020. This Saturday, we just concluded the 2022 Pinewood Derby in person and our Cub Scouts loved it.

The Patriot District FOS campaign goal for 2022 is \$68,000. This is our plan to meet it: Members of the District Staff and Commissioner Corps will donate \$16,000. They have already donated/pledged over \$10,000 this year. The remaining \$52,000 in funds will come from units, primarily Troops and Packs. We need the largest 12 troops to raise \$3,000 each and the largest 5 packs to raise \$2,000. The remaining Troops and Packs need to contribute at least \$1,000 each in donations.

People often question, "How much should I donate?" Here are some suggestions. If every family donated \$35, we would make our goal. Unfortunately, we know many families cannot afford to donate anything at this time due to financial difficulties, so this is what we ask:

- Each family that is able to do so, please donate \$20 to \$35.
- Families that are in better shape, please donate \$50 to \$100.
- Families that strongly believe in Scouting, please donate \$20 a month for a total of \$240.
- Fortunate families, please donate \$500 to a \$1,000.

There are several ways to donate. You can mail in a check or give it to you unit FOS coordinator. Another way is to pay on-line using an electric check or credit card. Additionally, NCAC has the capability to accept donations from the United Way or the Federal Combined Campaign. NCAC also accepts donations of appreciated stock, and donations made from IRA required minimum distributions or from a Donor Advised Fund. No matter how you donate, please make sure to notate that you are part of Patriot District so that we get credit for it.

After a one-year hiatus caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the annual Patriot District Pinewood Derby – the Super Bowl of Cub Scouting – was held on Saturday, March 5, at Living Savior Lutheran Church in Fairfax Station. It was a beautiful day for racing, and once again the event was a great success. 119 Cub Scouts, from 17 Patriot District Packs, registered to compete. Along with the Scouts, we had many parents, siblings and friends join in the fun. It was a memorable and fun-filled day for all!

For those that may not be aware, the District PWD was the very last event prior to the COVID-19 shutdown in March of 2020. It seems fitting somehow that the first unrestricted District event AFTER the shutdown would end up being our 2022 Pinewood Derby!

For the tenth consecutive year, the event was organized and led by Pete Griffiths, Patriot District PWD Chair, who also served as the Race Director. He was assisted by numerous Scouters and young Scouts BSA volunteers who helped to ensure everything went as smoothly as possible from start to finish. The leadership team consisted of several returning veterans including, our MC's Joe Margraf and Justin Day, Bill Dexter (various duties including supervision of registration), Steve Smith (venerable Pit Crew Boss and fix-it man), Pete's sons Peter, Jr. (registration) and Max (start sequencer). Several new members of the team included Brian

Roethlisberger (our race starter), Gary Black (photographer), and Pete's "Best Girl" Terry Dykeman (who helped throughout and provided emotional support to the Race Director!). Also with us throughout the day were Dan Lotz and Mike Gertz, who assisted in many ways, but especially in providing Derby setup and teardown help. A special thanks to Rob Irvine, our new official PWD DJ, who gave us music and audio throughout the day (awesome addition this year!).

As in previous years, our PWD MC's provided all in attendance with non-stop, always-stay-onyour-toes entertainment. While providing heat-by-heat announcing, our MC's contended with a number of odd visitors this year, including Iron Man, Spider Man, Black Panther, and an elderly gentleman looking for directions to some other derby. Amazingly, they all sounded like Joe Margraf, but who really knows!

Participating Cub Scouts competed in either Speed or Show categories within their respective Dens: Lions, Tigers, Bears, Wolves, Webelos Scouts, and Arrow of Light. Throughout the day, our Cub Scouts exemplified good sportsmanship, and it was inspiring once again to see these amazing future leaders together competing with fairness and respect.

For the speed competition, each car raced on the three lanes in use, with the lowest average time used to determine first, second, and third place winners. During the races, the Cub Scouts enjoyed cycling through as "starters" of each heat using the venerable PWD "plunge-o-matic," an indestructible(!) TNT detonator-like device that triggers the start-gate when the Cubs push down on the handle. The plunger, unofficially named "Go ahead and try to break me" has been with the Patriot District for many years now, but suffering no scars from our sometimes-overly-energetic Scouts!

For the second time, in the decade since Pete has been recording times, there was a no-kidding tie (for 3rd place in the Bear Den)! With a time of 3.1750, after averaging the three heat times together, with

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measurements out to the ten-thousandths place, a tie-breaker heat was run. The results of the runoff was within 30 thousandths of a second; these are some seriously close times!

In addition to the strong support provided by the core PWD team, invaluable assistance in a number of important areas was provided throughout the day by Scouts BSA from Troop 1346 and Troop 1345G. They helped with registration, moving cars from the registration site to the show table or the racing cars Impound Lot, and also shuttling cars from the finish line back to the start between races. The Scouts also judged the Show competition, making their decisions based on demonstrated creativity and car craftsmanship. A hearty thank you to all of these assisting Scouts for their invaluable contributions.

Once again we extend our appreciation to Pack 1101 for the use of its excellent track and hardware/software system. Lastly, a special thanks to everyone who participated in the setup on Friday evening and to those who stuck around for teardown and clean-up late on Saturday afternoon after the roar of the races had subsided and the crowd was gone.

The 2022 Patriot District Pinewood Derby again provided all participants and spectators with an extremely rewarding day marked by a steady stream of excitement, laughter, and typical Scouting goofiness. Overall, we were all also blessed to witness frequent reminders of the ideals and values that make this thing known as Scouting such a powerful and lasting growth medium for our young men and women. Camps at Goshen and Camp Snyder Still Have Opening for Counsellors.

Applicants must be at least 14 to apply for positions as Counselors in training(CIT), 15 for most paid counselors positions, 18 for positions as Commissioners and some Director positions and at least 21 for some Program Director positions, such as Aquatics and Shooting Sports. Patriot District Scout Wins Eagle Scout Project of the Year Award

Eagle Scout Jon Rummel of Troop 1346 was recently named the winner of the 2022 Glenn A. And Melinda Adams Eagle Scout Project of the Year Award for the National Capital Area Council (NCAC). The project involved building and deploying artificial fish habitats, also known as fish attractors, at six different locations at Burke Lake. Jon deployed three different types of artificial habitats at each of the six sites: wood pallet, bucket trees, and hose matrix types. He created and established a total of 18 fish habitats in the lake, which serve to help bait fish repopulate and thus provide more food for larger predatory fish.



Jon recognized that during the COVID-19 pandemic people had more time to fish, and many more became interested in this outdoor hobby. As a result, fishing pressures greatly increased. He worked with a Virginia State fisheries biologist to approve the plan and the Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) to deploy the habitats. His fishing habitats will provide areas for bait fish to thrive and give the predator fish good forage.

As the NCAC awardee, Jon will go on to compete against other Eagle projects on the regional level in hopes of eventually representing our Council at the national level as well! He will receive his award and recognition at the March 23rd NOESA Awards Dinner.

Seeking Scout Help for a Special Project

The Fairfax Villa Neighborhood Association in Fairfax is seeking the help of Patriot District Scouts for a special project in their neighborhood. The project involves clean up and restoration of an historic cemetery dating back to the late 1700s. The Neighborhood Association is working with the DAR and the Fairfax County Cemetery Preservation Association to delve into the history of the plot and to bring some attention to its significance in area history. The cemetery, located at 4422 San Carlos Drive in Fairfax, has previously had work projects conducted by Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts in years past, although nothing has been done there since 2012 when Scouts from a local troop did cleanup work.

The cemetery is very overgrown, although volunteers from the neighborhood have recently completed the first stage of clearing the lot. The next stage, where Scout participation would be very helpful and much appreciated, is multi-faceted and will include additional clearing of the upper section of the lot, removing many stumps of small trees, and perhaps adding some steps and benches. The Association is working with an historic arborist and putting together a Preservation Plan.

This effort would be a great community service project for a Patriot District Scouts BSA troop, or it could also serve as a worthwhile Eagle project. BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA SCOUTER CODE OF CONDUCT

On my honor, I promise to do my best to comply with this Boy Scouts of America Scouter Code of Conduct while serving in my capacity as an adult leader:

- 1. I have completed or will complete my registration with the Boy Scouts of America, answering all Questions truthfully and honestly.
- 2. I will do my best to live up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law, obey all laws, and hold others in Scouting accountable to those standards. I will exercise sound judgment and demonstrate good leadership and use the Scouting program for its intended purpose consistent with the mission of the Boy Scouts of America.
- **3.** I will make the protection of youth a personal priority. I will complete and remain current with Youth Protection training requirements. I will be familiar with and follow:
 - BSA Youth Protection policies and guidelines, including mandatory reporting: www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/
 - The Guide to Safe Scouting: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss
 - The Sweet Sixteen of BSA Safety: <u>www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/sweet16</u>
- 4. When transporting youth, I will obey all laws, comply with Youth Protection guidelines, and follow safe driving practices.
- 5. I will respect and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, BSA policies, and BSA-provided training, including but not limited to those relating to:
 - Unauthorized fundraising activities
 - Advocacy on social and political issues, including prohibited use of the BSA uniform and brand
 - Bullying, hazing, harassment, and unlawful discrimination of any kind
- 6. I will not discuss or engage in any form of sexual conduct while engaged in Scouting activities. I will refer youth with questions regarding these topics to talk to their parents or spiritual advisor.
- 7. I confirm that I have fully disclosed and will disclose in the future any of the following:
 - Any criminal suspicion, charges, or convictions of a crime or offense involving abuse, violence, sexual misconduct, or any misconduct involving minors or juveniles
 - Any investigation or court order involving domestic violence, child abuse, or similar matter
 - Any criminal charges or convictions for offenses involving controlled substances, driving while intoxicated, firearms, or dangerous weapons
- 8. I will not possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies:
 - Alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana
 - Concealed or unconcealed firearms, fireworks, or explosives
 - Pornography or materials containing words or images inconsistent with Scouting values
- 9. If I am taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing my functioning or judgment, I will not engage in activities that would put youth at risk, including driving or operating equipment.
- 10. I will take steps to prevent or report any violation of this code of conduct by others in connection
