# Spring Camporee 2015 Extravaganza Reenactment of the Battle of New Market

More than 1500 Boy Scouts, Webelos, and adult Scout volunteers from across the National Capital Area Council (NCAC) of the Boy Scouts of America (BSA), as well as more distant locations, participated in a special Spring Camporee held in New Market, Virginia, on April 17-19. Highlight of the event was a Grand Review and reenactment of the Civil War Battle of New Market, which occurred on May 15, 1864. The battle opened the Shenandoah Valley Campaign, and it was particularly noteworthy for the active participation by more than 250 cadets and instructors from Virginia Military Institute as part of the Confederate forces. The event served to commemorate the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of that war in April 1865, marked by the surrender of Confederate General Robert E. Lee to General Ulysses S. Grant, the commander of Union forces.

A majority of the participating Scouts were members of BSA Troops and Packs from 13 of the 23 Districts within the NCAC, which includes parts of Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia. Most of the Scouts were from BSA units within Northern Virginia Districts, including Bull Run (Manassas area), Colonial (Alexandria, Mount Vernon, Fort Belvoir Area), George Mason (Vienna area), Goose Creek (Ashburn area), Patriot (Burke, Fairfax, Fairfax Station, Annandale area), Occoquan (Dale City, Woodbridge), Old Dominion (Springfield, Falls Church, Annandale, Lorton), Piedmont (Warrenton, Culpeper area), and Powhatan (Herndon area). Participating Maryland Districts included Potomac, Seneca, White Oak, and Zekiah. In addition, BSA troops from Massachusetts (Troop 54, Boston), New York (Troop 45, Port Jefferson), New Jersey (Troop 226, Teaneck), and West Virginia (Troops 76 and 83) also traveled to New Market for this special event. Troop 50 of New Market served as the official host. In all, the event involved participation by Scouts from more than 90 Boy Scout Troops, Venturing Crews, and Webelos Packs.

The Troops from Massachusetts, Connecticut, New York, and West Virginia represented specific military units from their respective states that participated in the 1864 Battle of New Market. Troop 54 represented the 34th Massachusetts Regiment, which suffered 215 casualties (killed,

wounded, or missing) in the battle. Troop 45 represented the 1st New York (Veteran) Regiment, which suffered 47 casualties (killed, wounded, or missing). Troops 76 and 83 represented the 1st West Virginia Regiment, which suffered 76 casualties (killed, wounded, or missing) at New Market.

The Camporee, Grand Review, and New Market Battle reenactment, organized by members of the Patriot District Committee, was held in partnership with the Shenandoah Valley Battlefields Foundation and Virginia Military Institute (VMI). VMI manages the New Market Battlefield State Historical Park, which is an historic American Civil War battlefield and national historic district located near New Market, Shenandoah County, Virginia. The district encompasses the site of the Battle of New Market and includes the Virginia Museum of the Civil War.

Scouts and adult leaders arrived on Friday afternoon and evening and set up camp around the battlefield in preparation for the weekend's activities. The formal opening on Saturday morning was led by Scout Beckman Hollis of Troop 150 in Annandale, Virginia, who served as the Camporee Senior Patrol Leader. The ceremony included short inspirational remarks by Major Troy Marshall, VMI Site Director for the Virginia Museum of the Civil War, and Kevin Walker, CEO of the Shenandoah Valley Battlefields Foundation, which has its headquarters in New Market. Each was presented a 35-star flag, the official United States flag in May 1864, and a special patch commemorating the Camporee for their respective roles in supporting Camporee planning.

Following the opening ceremonies, Scouts participated in separate training sessions for Union and Confederate forces, walked the battlefield, toured the Virginia Museum of the Civil War, and visited the Bushong house and farm. The Bushong house, which is located in the middle of the battlefield, was used by both Union and Confederate forces as a hospital during the battle. Saturday afternoon featured rehearsals for the Grand Review and the New Market Battle Reenactment. At dusk, five individual outdoor church services were held on the battlefield, including a Protestant service, a Catholic mass, observation of the Jewish Sabbath, a Muslim call to prayer, and a non-denominational gathering. A late evening campfire featuring Scout skits, VMI cadets, a cadet bagpiper, a Mountain Man singer, and a remarkable story regarding the legend of Taps provided by Dave Super closed out the day.

More than 200 people gathered along the ridge above the battlefield on Sunday morning to observe the Camporee's main events. A prayer for the safety and well-being of American military forces was read by a Scout Chaplain from Troop 54. The Grand Review, a parade of all participating BSA units in front of the reviewing stand, followed. During the Civil War, commanders often held such reviews of their troops to ascertain the size, health, equipment, and morale of their soldiers. The reviews gave the soldiers an opportunity to show off their units and impress the commanding officer. This tradition continues today. Scout Izziddin Abdul Rashid of Crew 114, Herndon, Virginia, served as the lead narrator for the Camporee Grand Review, with other Scouts from six NCAC Districts announcing the passage of each Scout unit in turn.

On completing the Grand Review, the two Scout armies formed on opposite sides of the field of battle. Scout Declan Deady of Troop 1346 in Burke, Virginia, presented a detailed narration to inform the audience and direct opposing armies during the reenactment. Union forces were commanded by Major General Franz Sigel, played by Scouter Jack Oliva of Troop 1100, Burke, Virginia. Confederate forces were led by Major General John C. Breckinridge, played by Brian Weinshenker, a Social Studies and English teacher in Fairfax County Public Schools; prior to the Civil War, MG Breckinridge had served as Vice President of the United States under President James Buchanan. Both Scout armies comprised more than 700 Scouts. As the battle commenced, Union forces were quickly

in disarray and forced to retreat as Confederate forces rapidly advanced and claimed victory. The battle at New Market was the last major Confederate victory in the Shenandoah Valley.

The Scout reenactment of the Battle of New Market particularly highlighted the contributions and sacrifices made by the VMI cadets in May 1864. Chris Wallace, Troop 1131 Scoutmaster, played the role of Lieutenant Colonel Scott Shipp, who commanded the VMI Corps of Cadets at the Battle of New Market. To honor and respect the 57 cadets who were killed or wounded at New Market, 57 Scouts fell to the field in remembrance. Four cadets from the present VMI corps also performed a ceremonial demonstration on the field, fixing their bayonets and mounting a charge.

The Camporee and New Market Battle reenactment closed with a recitation of President Lincoln's Gettysburg address by Scout Max Wohlleben of Troop 993, Alexandria, Virginia. These words were considered to be just as relevant at New Market as they were at Gettysburg, reflecting our nation's commitment to freedom and democracy across the centuries, from the Revolutionary War to today. A solemn playing of Taps echoed across the valley as Scouts drifted from the hallowed ground of the battlefield to break camp and return to their homes.

A new and unique element of this Camporee was the creation and deployment of a "press corps" comprised of eight Scouts from various Districts. Sporting red "PRESS" caps, these Scouts served as on-the-field reporters and photographers, taking notes and pictures and conducting short interviews with Scouts and adult leaders throughout the event. With unrestricted freedom of movement, their efforts helped to collect detailed information and document the Camporee as never done before. One Scout reporter provided a detailed accounting of Union forces training on Saturday afternoon, noting how the Union General explained the overall force structure, described battlefield tactics, demonstrated the movement of Union forces, discussed the importance of protecting the flanks, and reviewed the principal reasons for the Union defeat.

One Scout showed great enthusiasm for having the opportunity to "learn military strategy for the battle," noting that the battle reenactment "was really great fun." A Scout from Troop 1966 stated that he was "...very excited to be here; I'm learning so much. I really like this Camporee." Commented another, "This is a fantastic event... and it is very informative." Although some Scouts found the Saturday heat and the long walk to the Bushong farm and the museum a bit grueling, most of them were able to summon new energy and rise to the occasion as they participated in the battle reenactment. One Scout summed up his feelings this way: "This is a great Camporee; it rates a 10 out of 10."

Once again, members of the Order of the Arrow provided invaluable assistance in many areas in helping to make this special Spring Camporee a great success. The Camporee Senior Patrol Leader, Beckman Hollis, is a member of the OA; assisted by other OA Scouts, he provided exemplary Scout leadership throughout the event. OA Scouts also organized and executed the Opening Ceremony, prepared the Friday night "Cracker Barrel," and planned and led the Saturday night campfire. All of these activities were well organized and effectively conducted. As always, the OA transported, set up, and organized the camporee headquarters, to include preparing and serving five meals to more than 30 people during the weekend. The OA also set up and manned the Camporee first aid station. Additionally, during the camporee, OA Scouts conducted internal business activities that included holding troop elections and calling out new members at the Saturday night campfire. In recognition of 2015 being the 100th anniversary of the establishment of the Order of the Arrow, many Scouts and adult OA members were their white OA sashes throughout the weekend.

Planning efforts for this Spring Camporee extravaganza, led by Patriot District Camporee Director Bill Dexter, extended over two years. The great success of the event is attributable to his

leadership and the great efforts of many volunteers who assisted in both its planning and execution stages. Jae and Jackie Engelbrecht, together with Lee Cass, served as Camporee Commissioners. Dave Astle, Kristin Chioma, Paul Hoffman, and Greg Wagner served as Patriot District Commissioners. Registration duties were competently handled by Carol Cass. Administration and logistics functions were managed by Joe Casey. John Merchant, Kristin Chioma, and Pat Ring served as advisors to the OA throughout the event. [Pat Ring's long service in supporting camporee headquarters setup and cooking activities over many years, as well as OA Ordeal and Brotherhood events, came to a close with this event. Thanks, Pat, for your long and commendable record of service to Scouts.] Religious services on Saturday evening were led by Doc Johnson, Mark Greer, Howard Spielman, and Rashid Adbullah. Bill Snowden, Patriot District Vice Chair for Program Impact, provided comprehensive assistance in planning the event, in organizing and guiding the Scout press corps, and in working with the Scout narrators for the Grand Review and Battle Reenactment. Headquarters support was provided by John Cavan, Howard and Susan Lichtman, Jennifer and Abigayle Allred, and Alex Greer. Kelly O'Malley, Greg Wagner, and Dave Astle assisted in organizing the Grand Review. Bill Edmunds served as VMI Liaison.

National Capital Area Council was well represented at the Camporee. Participating for the entire weekend were Sue Hart, Central Virginia Field Director; Kyle Molldene, Patriot District Executive; Justin Mawsdley, Old Dominion District Executive; and Joel Jackson, Colonial District Executive. Also attending for selected events were Dan Hogan, NCAC Director of Field Services; and Garry Lewis, Council Commissioner. Rick Hillenbrand, a member of the National Commissioner Support Staff, camped with Troop 76 from West Virginia.

# **Praise for Spring Camporee 2015 from Visiting Troops**

Troops from distant states participating in the Spring Camporee Extravaganza included Troop 54 from Boston/Brookline, Massachusetts, and Troop 226 from Teaneck, New Jersey. Following the Camporee, complimentary messages of praise and thanks were contained in messages directed to Phil Sternberg, who coordinated the participation of these Jewish troops. Selected comments are provided below:

From Daniel Thumin, Assistant Scoutmaster of Troop 54:

On April 16-19, 2015, our Boy Scouts of Troop 54 traveled to Gettysburg, PA; Harper's Ferry, WV; and New Market, VA to learn about the U.S. Civil War and participate in a camporee and battle re-enactment. We were accompanied by guests from Troop 613 of White Plains, NY and Troop 226 of Teaneck, NJ. With some generous accommodations from the camporee committee (including provision of a synagogue tent, and a repetition of the Saturday morning training for our group in the afternoon), we were able to observe Shabbat on the battlefield and fully participate in the events, along with two other Jewish troops from VA and MD. We had many guests come to visit us in the synagogue tent during the camp-wide chapel service time on Saturday afternoon (mincha) and at other times, and a Jewish VMI cadet who had previously served

in the Israeli Defense Force camped with us. One of our Scouts acted as chaplain for the re-enactment, by reading the Jewish prayer for American military forces at the opening convocation.

The highlight of the battle of New Market was the participation of VMI cadets, the most prominent of whom was Moses Ezekiel, who was not only Jewish but proudly identified as such. Our presence at this battlefield was tremendously educational for us, and also for many others who participated in the event. We all learned about Moses Ezekiel and his fellow cadets, and our presence demonstrated how Jews continue to carry on our traditional observances while participating along with the other Scouts, wearing the same uniforms, and together re-enacting this important event in American history in which Jews fought side-by-side with their compatriots on both sides.

Participating in the camporee was a tremendously inspirational and educational experience.

From Daniel Chazin, Scoutmaster of Troop 226, Teaneck, New Jersey:

Thank you so much for inviting us to participate in the New Market Battlefield Reenactment Camporee... I found it to be an inspiring experience that I will never forget. To begin with, I want to thank Scoutmaster Howard Spielman of Troop 54 in Brookline, MA, who arranged for a four-day trip for the Scouts of his troop (with which we joined). Our trip included a visit to Gettysburg and to Harpers Ferry, thus enabling us to obtain contrasting perspectives on the Civil War and its effect on the Nation.

Our experience at New Market was special in a number of ways. First of all, this is the first time I've participated in a Camporee that extended over our Sabbath in which we were able to participate fully. We were able to attend the opening ceremony on Saturday morning, as well as to participate in the tours of the Bushong home and grounds on Saturday afternoon. We were also able to visit the Civil War Museum and hike to the monument on the other side of I-81, as all the other troops did. And, of course, we could participate in the reenactment on Sunday morning, with one of our Scouts proudly marching in with our troop flag.

Because we were holding our religious services on Saturday morning, we were not able to participate in the discussions of the Civil War battle that took place at that time. But instead, the Scouter who gave the presentation in the morning (as General Franz Sigel) gave a special presentation to our group in the late afternoon. His presentation was one of the most interesting and effective that I have ever attended. All of the Scouts listened intently to the presentation and asked many good questions.

There were several moments during the weekend that were particularly inspiring. To me, the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance as part of the opening ceremony on Saturday morning was a special experience. Of course, I've recited the Pledge many, many times, and I usually don't think much about it. But here we were on a Civil War battlefield – and on a battlefield where we commemorate the victory of the Confederates and honor those who fought for the Confederate cause – especially the Virginia Military Institute (VMI) Cadets. Yet now, 150 years later, we could all join together and recite the words "one Nation, under God, indivisible." I don't think that the recitation of the Pledge ever meant as much to me as it did on Saturday morning.

Then, on Saturday afternoon, during our tour of the Bushong House, we visited one of the rooms that had been set up as a makeshift hospital for those wounded in the battle. The guide explained to us that the local residents opened their homes to the wounded soldiers and cared for them. One of the Scouts (from another troop) asked which soldiers were cared for – Confederate soldiers or Union soldiers. The guide answered that, here in New Market, the residents cared for all the wounded soldiers – both Confederate and Union. She then continued that when, later in 1864, General Sheridan of the Union forces recaptured the Shenandoah Valley, he adopted a "scorched earth" policy and destroyed everything in the valley. But when they reached New Market, he remembered how the local residents had cared for the wounded Union soldiers after the battle, and his forces left the town alone and did not destroy it. Again, this is a really inspiring story that I will always remember.

Another special feature of the Camporee for us was the participation of a Jewish VMI cadet who had spent two years serving with the Israel Defense Forces. His participation at the Camporee established another link between the Jewish people and the battlefield site, which commemorates the bravery of the VMI Cadets (including the Jewish cadet Moses Ezekiel) in the battle. During our Sabbath afternoon service, we gave the Cadet an aliyah (calling him to read the Torah), and we later remarked that this was almost certainly the first time that a VMI Cadet had received an aliyah on the New Market Battlefield.

And then, during the Sunday morning reenactment ceremony, a Scout from Troop 54 was called upon to read a special prayer for the American Armed Forces. This prayer has particular meaning to me because it was composed by a member of my synagogue in Teaneck, N.J. Yesterday morning, I saw Moshe Markovitz, the author of the prayer, and told him how it been recited before a group of over 1,500 people at the Camporee. He responded by pointing out that he had deliberately composed it as a non-denominational prayer so that it could be used for all audiences.

I have been a Scoutmaster for 37 years. I've attended eight National Jamborees and have been on 14 Philmont treks. This Camporee ranks as one of most outstanding experiences of my Scouting career, and it is an event that I will never forget. I'm sure that the Scouts from my troop who attended will also remember their experiences at the Camporee. Thank you so much for organizing this wonderful event and inviting us to participate.

### From the Commissioner

Wow! What an awesome Camporee. A special thanks to Bill Dexter and his District Camporee Team for its inception, planning and execution. And thanks to all the Commissioners and leaders from other Districts who played key roles.

An important date is approaching for Cub Packs interested in a strong Journey to Excellence program. To earn Silver in the Volunteer Leadership category, a Pack must "Achieve Bronze, and by <u>May 31</u>, the pack committee identifies pack and den leadership for the next year." You can change leadership later, but you'll need a plan by May 31<sup>st</sup>. As you identify those leaders, I hope you'll encourage them to attend the Midway Session of this month's Roundtable (7:30 – 8:00, May 14<sup>th</sup>) for Program Launch. There should be plenty of materials to finish planning out your next year's program. Sometimes new leaders don't realize there are resources beyond the unit. Program Launch brings those resources together in one time and place.

Our Commissioners have noticed that there is a lot of activity focused on advancement. Cub Scouts are finishing up their ranks. New Boy Scouts are working hard to complete many requirements for Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class. Scouts are also picking their merit badges for summer camp. As leaders, we know advancement is important because it can help build character, citizenship and fitness. Yet, in the 1936 version of the *Handbook for Scoutmasters*, we are reminded that "To a boy *Scouting is a game*, a magnificent game, full of play and full of laughter, keeping him busy, keeping him *happy*. That is the strength of Scouting! A boy becomes a Scout for the sheer fun there is in it. The *action* in Scouting appeals to the boy's impulse to be doing something... There is *adventure* in Scouting. There is adventure in tackling a job alone—all by oneself, or with the gang... There is always present an *urge to achieve*. A harder task, a higher rank always looms ahead; there is distinction to be gained." The trick is to provide the opportunity to achieve while masking it in the language and experiences of game, action and adventure.






