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From the District Chairman

The nominating committee for Patriot District is currently working to develop a slate of officers for 2021, which will be presented to the Patriot District Committee at our District business meeting to be held on Tuesday evening, November 27, at 7:30 PM. The meeting will be held via Zoom. The nominating committee is looking to identify candidates for our Vice Chair of Finance and other important positions, including Deputy Vice Chair for Membership, Friends of Scouting Coordinator, Training Chair, and Merit Badge Dean. The nominating committee also is required to recommend a person for the position of District Commissioner to NCAC. Our District makes a recommendation but Council makes the final decision. Dave Astle, our current commissioner, will be travelling extensively next year so we need to recommend a replacement. Please forward any recommendations to Steve Smith.

So far, our region that includes the Burke, West Springfield, Springfield, Fairfax Station and Fairfax City communities has been able to survive the pandemic in part due to the hard work of ECHO (Ecumenical Community Helping Others). Over the last few months, ECHO has provided food for over a thousand local families. ECHO depends on local organizations to support them and we, Patriot District, are going to conduct a food drive for them on Saturday, October 17. As a large organization with over 60 units and 1,800 Scouts we are well organized to provide this service and make a difference to the community. See the article on page 10 for details.

Advance notice: On Veteran's Day, November 11, NCAC will salute our Service Members and their Families at a virtual ceremony. Details are provided in a letter from the Council Executive that is included in a separate document being distributed with this issue of the Patriot Press. From the District Commissioner

This month I'm going to put on my Council Merit Badge Dean hat and discuss the recent changes to Scoutbook regarding Merit Badge Counselors. Most, if not all, counselors recently received an email from Scoutbook that was confusing and even misleading. On 9/21/20 changes were made to Scoutbook that allow ScoutNET (master BSA data base) to do a daily synchronization with Scoutbook. Counselors who were registered when we had an organic registrar did not have their approved merit badges entered into ScoutNET when they were initially registered. With the initial sync with Scoutbook, these counselors had no merit badges to sync with Scoutbook, which is why they received an email saying they were now in Scoutbook with no merit badges to counsel. We've heard from some counselors that their list in Scoutbook is incorrect. Merit Badges listed in Scoutbook for a counselor could be incorrect for a number of reasons. Registered counselors who were registered through Member Data Shared Services (the National registrar we've been using for several years) and either already or not already in Scoutbook may have added to their list of merit badges after their initial registration and their updated Counselor Information Form never made it to MDSS to update their profile and those badges would not have been placed into Scoutbook with this initial sync. We, Council Advancement, are in the process of trying to update Scoutbook via a Council upload into Scoutbook of the current information on counselors held in the Districts. This will take some time however.

There seems to be a bit of misunderstanding by a lot of counselors that they counsel for a particular troop or two. All counselors serve in a Council position that is managed by their Districts. If they were to print out their membership card, it would say they are a merit badge counselor in the NCAC. As of 9/21/20, all counselors are available to counsel throughout the Council. Those not wishing to be available Council wide or even within the District need to fix it themselves by going into Scoutbook, opening my account, my positions, and then merit badge counselor. This will present a screen where they can annotate whether they're available to counsel or busy, and then select how they wish to be seen in a search. They can choose Council, district(s), unit(s), or not listed. Even though some counselors were informed they were not on the Council list and were no longer listed in Scoutbook (I was actually one of those), everyone who was in Scoutbook on 9/20/20 is still in Scoutbook along with every currently registered counselor who was not yet in Scoutbook.

With this daily ScoutNET sync with Scoutbook comes units no longer being able to add counselors and make any changes to the badges they counsel. All of this data now comes from the daily sync or changes made to the Scoutbook MB list by the Council. Also, there are a number of volunteers listed in Scoutbook who are not registered as a counselor. These counselors will remain in Scoutbook until February 1, 2021, at which time they and their connections with Scouts will be removed. So how can a counselor determine whether they're currently registered? Open "my profile" in the my.scouting.org website menu. If you are registered, it will be shown there. If you are not registered, you have four months to get registered or be removed.

I hope this answers the many questions Scoutbook emails have generated. If you still have questions, please contact me.



RECHARTERING FOR 2021

Successful rechartering is all about preparation. If the proper groundwork is laid, on-line rechartering is a simple exercise. If not, it becomes both a hassle and error-prone. In the September issue of the Patriot Press, everyone was urged to organize their rosters for the coming year, to make sure that everyone in the unit is registered, to identify everyone who is or is not going to re-register, and to collect the fees for the coming year. Hopefully, all of that has been accomplished.

If you have not already done so, please submit any pending registrations now. Registrations submitted with the recharter slow down processing at every level, which increases the chance that the entire recharter submission will be held up because of problems. Resolving a problem with an individual registration is much easier than dealing with one in the middle of a recharter submission.

YPT is going to be a problem this year. Before submitting adult registrations for your unit, be prepared to drop someone who doesn't respond. They can re-register later if they want to stay in the unit.

Finally, please submit your rechartering package to your unit commissioner by November 10th. The submissions receive careful review by the district, and we need to get them to council as soon as possible to make sure that they are processed before your charter expires after December 31st. Late submissions are going to be going to the registrar in a virtual "tsunami" of paperwork arriving all at once, and can expect to be processed in the order received.

High Adventure 2022

Attention all NCAC Units planning High Adventure trips in 2022: Here are Important Facts To Know about Unit Reservation Dates and Procedures for booking 2022 adventures:

Lotteries: Only Philmont continues to operate a lottery system to reserve expedition dates in 2022. Northern Tier and Sea Base are first-come, first-served open registrations.

Dates: Philmont Lottery System opens early in October and closes December 1st, 2020. Lottery selections will be made randomly by computer after December 1st (i.e., reservations will **not** be assigned in the order that requests are made). Units may now enter the Philmont lottery in consecutive years. Go **here** to download a 2022 registration info packet with explicit instructions and processes.

Northern Tier Open Registration opens in early October for 2022 Summer Treks (all bases) and January 19th, 2021 for Winter (2021-22) Treks. There are limited numbers of treks available on each date, so having backup dates when making a reservation is essential. Reservations are first-come, first-served; you will know immediately if your request is available and must pay a \$250 deposit. Go here for registration information.

Sea Base also operates on a first-come, first-served basis – but the opening date is <u>coming soon</u>, as of early October. Reservations are immediate and so is the deposit due (\$250). Go **here** for 2022 reservation details; check back frequently for when the system will open – also check their Facebook page **here**.

*NOTE: as of late Wednesday, September 23rd National BSA is looking at pushing these registration dates to something later. Check the Base websites for up-to-date info.

Goshen 2021: Registration is now open for Scouts and Webelos Camps. It is likely that the numbers participating on any week will be limited, so register early to ensure you can get your preferred week.

Camp Snyder Fall Activities

Camp Snyder is offering activity filled family camping weekends for family camping! Enjoy climbing, woodworking, STEM, shooting sports, handicrafts and more. All activities will be scheduled to provide the safest possible environment for you and your family.

Update on STEM Scouts Laboratory Units in Patriot District

STEM Scouts was developed by scientists at Oakridge National Laboratory in 2014, and it has since been taken around the country wherein educators design 20 activities/year for girls and boys in grades 3-8 to explore STEM through hands-on learning! Activity kits, lab journals, and curriculum are packaged and provided to the families who participate in STEM Scouts.

Starting on Oct 1st 2020, youth in the Patriot District will be able to register for the following STEM Scouts Laboratory (Lab) Units:

- Junior Lab Unit #605 for elementary school Grades 3 to 5
- Technology Lab Unit #6022 for middle school Grades 6 to 8

Both Labs are tentatively scheduled to meet on Mondays for 22 sessions from October 2020 through June 2021, 7:00 - 8:00 PM.

Patriot District Food Drive in Support of ECHO

Patriot District is again supporting ECHO (Ecumenical Community Helping Others) by sponsoring a food drive on Saturday, October 17, from noon until 4 PM. Parents and Scouts are asked to drop off their donated food at the Westwood Baptist Church, 8200 Old Keene Mill Road, Burke. The church is next to the Cary office building. Scouts can place the food on the pavement or pop the trunk and volunteers will take the box/bag from the car. Scouts are asked to wear their uniform, either Class A or Class B, when delivering the food donation. The food drive will take place rain or shine.

Scouts should bring food from their home and possibly from friends, neighbors and relatives. When collecting food, Scouts should remain safe at all times. They should practice "social distancing" by asking others to place their donation at a specified spot near the Scout's home, such as on the front porch or at the mail box. The food needs to be non-perishable in non-breakable containers (no glass jars please); donations can also include personal care items such as tooth paste and toothbrushes. Visit ECHO' website at http://www.echo-inc.org for suggestions on what to donate.

ECHO is a charitable organization supported by 22 churches in the Burke, Springfield, West Springfield, Fairfax Station, and Fairfax area that provides help for families. Currently, they are providing support to over 1,000 families. There is hunger among a significant portion of the population, and families in need of food turn to ECHO for support. **This is us supporting our local neighbors.** The children getting food will likely be sitting in the same classrooms as our Scouts will be when regular school resumes. The ECHO facility is located at 7205 Old Keene Mill Road, Springfield, Virginia 22150.

Unit leaders from packs, troops and crews are asked to register with Pat Ring by Tuesday, October 13, to let us know their unit will participate. Just send him an e-mail at pring978@gmail.com. After the food drive, notify him of the approximate number of Scout families that participated. While ECHO will weigh the food, Patriot District would like to get an idea as to how many Scouts participated. Participation in this food drive fulfills item #6, Community Service, for Scouts working on the NCAC Scouting at Home 2020 Award.

The Order of the Arrow (OA) will take the lead on this project. They will have a team of eight Scouts at the Westwood Baptist Church receiving the food donations and another team at the ECHO facility to move the donations inside, weigh and record them. Scouts who want to volunteer to work on either team should send an email to patriotchapter@wipit470.org

Patriot District Eagle Scout Accomplishes Incredible Feat!

Troop 1346 Eagle Scout Michael Volkman of Burke has become the first Patriot District Scout to earn all available merit badges. Michael, a senior at Lake Braddock Secondary School, recently completed his 138th merit badge, concluding a quest that took over six years. In the long history of the BSA, fewer than 500 Scouts have been able to earn all available merit badges.

Michael began his Scouting journey in 2009 as a Tiger Cub in Pack 1346 where he earned the Arrow of Light. He crossed over to Troop 1346 in 2014. In Troop 1346, Michael served in a series of Troop leadership positions, including Senior Patrol Leader, Assistant Senior Patrol Leader, and Troop Guide. He is a Brotherhood member of the Order of the Arrow and completed National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT).

Michael would be an exceptional Scout even without his merit badge feat. He completed his Eagle Board of Review in July. Michael earned the Charles L. Sommers Grand Slam of National High Adventure Award for completing treks at all four BSA National High Adventure bases: Philmont, Sea Base, Northern Tier, and the Summit Bechtel Reserve. In 2018, Michael also participated in the inaugural session of Okpik-Kapvik, Northern Tier's newest cold weather winter camping program in Muskegon, Michigan. He attended the 2019 World Jamboree, as well as the Transatlantic Council's Camporee in Normandy, France commemorating the 75th Anniversary of D-Day. Michael also earned Scouting's highest Roman Catholic religious award, the Pope Pius XII Religious Medal. Along the way, Michael racked up nearly 140 camping nights, almost 350 miles of hiking, four STEM Nova awards, numerous aquatics awards, the Japanese Interpreter's Strip, and other recognitions too numerous to list.

At Lake Braddock, Michael is a member of the National Honor Society, Computer Science Honor Society, Math Honor Society, and Japanese Honor Society. Michael intends to study computer engineering in college. In his spare (?) time, Michael also enjoys baseball, playing the piano, and video gaming.

Pack 1967 Summer Activity Club and NOVA Awards Program

In response to the Coronavirus Pandemic, the National Capital Area Council encouraged all Scouts to stay home and be Scout Safe throughout the crisis. The Council created a special award, called the "Scouting at Home 2020 Award," to recognize the unique challenge this presented to our Scouts and their families, encourage them to live the Scout Oath and Law even when typical Scouting activities are disrupted.

Cub Scout Pack 1967 heeded this call and developed a robust program of socially-distant activities to further promote Scouting during the summer. First, the Pack established a "Summer Adventure Club," where Scouts completed virtual National Park Service Junior Ranger programs, served their community, and participated in fun STEM activities (including a marshmallow-shooter competition!). Each week had a different theme. For eight weeks, Scouts and guests participated in an interactive, virtual meeting each Monday, completed a variety of fun and educational activities during the week, and then met again on Thursday to share their experiences. The Summer Adventure Club averaged 28 participants for each week of the program. Through their participation and completion of activities, the Scouts could earn up to four patches: one for each type of activity and one summer bucket list patch for doing at least one of each.









In addition, Pack 1967 offered three NOVA Award programs to Wolves, Bears, Webelos Scouts, and AOL Scouts. Through these programs, Cub Scouts learned how math affects their life each day, explored the wonders of archaeology, and learned about computer coding. Finally, the Pack hosted several fun Pack events, including a virtual ice cream social and virtual campout.



Scouts were encouraged to "bring-a-friend" (virtually, of course) to all of these events, and Pack 1967 worked closely with Pack 1968 to ensure all Cub Scouts in the Kings Park West neighborhood had the opportunity to participate in the Summer Adventure Club and NOVA Award programs. The final attendance numbers are impressive. The grand total summation of all Scouts and guests at all Pack events this summer was 348!

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BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA SCOUTER CODE OF CONDUCT

On my honor, I promise to do my best to comply with this Boy Scouts of America Scouter Code of Conduct while serving in my capacity as an adult leader:

- 1. I have completed or will complete my registration with the Boy Scouts of America, answering all Questions truthfully and honestly.
- 2. I will do my best to live up to the Scout Oath and Scout Law, obey all laws, and hold others in Scouting accountable to those standards. I will exercise sound judgment and demonstrate good leadership and use the Scouting program for its intended purpose consistent with the mission of the Boy Scouts of America.
- 3. I will make the protection of youth a personal priority. I will complete and remain current with Youth Protection training requirements. I will be familiar with and follow:
 - BSA Youth Protection policies and guidelines, including mandatory reporting: www.scouting.org/training/youth-protection/
 - The Guide to Safe Scouting: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss
 - The Sweet Sixteen of BSA Safety: www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/sweet16
- 4. When transporting youth, I will obey all laws, comply with Youth Protection guidelines, and follow safe driving practices.
- 5. I will respect and abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Boy Scouts of America, BSA policies, and BSA-provided training, including but not limited to those relating to:
 - Unauthorized fundraising activities
 - Advocacy on social and political issues, including prohibited use of the BSA uniform and brand
 - Bullying, hazing, harassment, and unlawful discrimination of any kind
- 6. I will not discuss or engage in any form of sexual conduct while engaged in Scouting activities. I will refer youth with questions regarding these topics to talk to their parents or spiritual advisor.
- 7. I confirm that I have fully disclosed and will disclose in the future any of the following:
 - Any criminal suspicion, charges, or convictions of a crime or offense involving abuse, violence, sexual misconduct, or any misconduct involving minors or juveniles
 - Any investigation or court order involving domestic violence, child abuse, or similar matter
 - Any criminal charges or convictions for offenses involving controlled substances, driving while intoxicated, firearms, or dangerous weapons
- 8. I will not possess, distribute, transport, consume, or use any of the following items prohibited by law or in violation of any Scouting rules, regulations, and policies:
 - Alcoholic beverages or controlled substances, including marijuana
 - Concealed or unconcealed firearms, fireworks, or explosives
 - Pornography or materials containing words or images inconsistent with Scouting values
- 9. If I am taking prescription medications with the potential of impairing my functioning or judgment, I will not engage in activities that would put youth at risk, including driving or operating equipment.
- 10. I will take steps to prevent or report any violation of this code of conduct by others in connection with Scouting activities.
